There is a royal order duly recorded to England that the union tack shall not be "worn" except upon the ships of the royal navy. Lord Knollys, the king's private secretary, has recently ruled, ship may always "fly" the jack. The and "fly" has excited something of a controversy in England, and that controversy has developed the astonishing fact that the union jack as now commonly understood is not, in fact, the real union jack at all.

The error has arisen from the fact not conform exactly to the words of the royal decree. The orders concerning the jack were drawn at the time of the formation of the British union in 1800. 


