Both figures must soon come down. New vegetables are coming from California and will soon be on sale here. All kinds of meats are high. Apples are still plentiful in this market. Wheat and oats are selling well, but there is not much demand for hops or prunes.

According to the present law half of one's taxes must be paid before April 15th and the balance by October, there being a considerable penalty for delinquency in either case. As a further inducement to the prompt payment of taxes a rebate of 3 percent will be made on all tax money paid before March 15th. Last year a big percent of the whole amount was paid before that date and the same will probably be true again this year. It would even pay one to borrow money to pay by the middle of March. The tax rolls are now being completed and are sure to be in the hands of the sheriff for the reception of taxes by the middle of next week.
