Wool to be Pooled.

The sheep men of this county met here last Friday and entered into an organization similar to the mohair pool, with J. H. Hawley as president and H. L. Fenton secretary. There are thought to be over 15,000 sheep in the county and that the pool will contain 100,000 pounds of wool. Last year prices without a pool ranged from 12 to 16 cents but a better price is anticipated at the pool sale some time in June. Mr. Fenton is to be the special agent of the wool growers, looking after all their interests, furnishing storage, receiving and shipping their output, all for a commission of half a cent a pound.

Sunday School Convention.

The Sunday schools of Polk county will unite in a convention in the Presbyterian church at Independence on April 23rd and 24th. After devotional exercises at 2 o'clock on Thursday, Dr. Thompson will give an address of welcome to which M. M. Jones and Mrs. Sargent will respond. Then delegates will be enrolled and committees appointed. After that Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Jones will tell how Sunday school teachers and officers should be appointed and there will follow a general discussion of the characteristics of a good school. There will be evening addresses by Rev. T. P. Hayden and Rev. C. C. Poling. On Friday morning Rev. E. C. Wigmore will speak of the parent as a character builder. S. Snyder, of the teacher as a character builder, and Dr. Locke and Mr. Sloan of the superintendent as a builder of character, after which Rev. B. J. Kelly will discuss the importance of teachers' meetings. Before noon the question box will be opened and reports from schools will be heard. At dinner Rev. A. A. Winter will tell what should be done during Sunday school. Mr. Wigmore will talk about the blunders of teachers, and Mrs. Tuck and Mr. Hawley about the primary department and the cradle roll. After that Prof. Reynolds will speak of the hindrances to Sunday schools. Committee reports will be heard and officers elected, and in conclusion the state worker will show the benefits of unity and state conventions. The evening Prof. Whitley will talk about the home department and there will be an address by Dr. Thompson.

Evangelical Conference.
