

His field is wider, so he can concoct more weird imaginings than the man who deals with a more limited sphere of human activity. But just how any one could be led to consider the possibility that hog cholera was caused by sweet milk, the most perfect food known, and water, an essential element to life and health, quite passes comprehension And yet there are thousands of farmers who believe that hog cholera is caused by this or that kind of food. Many are quite sure that it comes from feeding new corn. The man who wants to know the truth can nall down this fact: Hog cholera comes from hog cholera; nothing else. It is a transmissi-ble disease, just as smallpox is a transmissible disease. It is a germ disease, and the germs may lie in the ground for months and yet retain virulence sufficient to cause another outbreak if swine are exposed to them. Make a mixture of gasoline and one-fourth as much wood alcohol, in which has been dissolved as much corrosive sublimate (bichloride of mercury) as it will hold. Inject this with a syringe into the cracks of a wall and floors and spray "infested" furniture with it, behind and under uphoistered seats, etc. Take one room at a time, being careful to have no fire or artificial light about, and shut the room up closely for eight hours. The process may have to be repeated once a month for perhaps three but if faithfully done it is sure death
