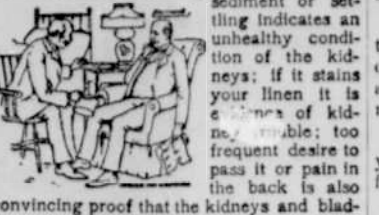
Dr. Lee Steiner, who went from here to Lakeview, has moved back to Salem on account of his health.
