How to Guard Against Colds.

Sunshine and air do more to frighten away the demon of colds, in whatever form, than do any number of doctors or medicines. People who sleep with their windows open are far wiser than those who hermetically seal themselves against any fresh air until they arise. And don't accustom yourself to never be in a draft for a minute, for it is sure to be unavoidable at times, and then if you are not used to it you will catch cold.

How to Brighten Diamond Rings.

To clean and brighten diamond rings and like jewels pour a little alcohol or perfume into the palm of your hand, dip the stones therein, wetting them thoroughly, and dry upon a silk or linen handkerchief. It will make them surprisingly bright.

How to Preserve Orange Peel.

Weigh the oranges whole and allow a pound of sugar to each pound of fruit. Peel carefully and cut the rind into slender strips. Boil, changing the water twice, until very tender. Squeeze the strained orange juice upon the sugar, let this heat to a boil, drain the orange strips and drop into this sirup. Boil for twenty minutes and take from the fire.

How to Freshen Bedrooms.

Add a little turpentine to the water used for scrubbing the floor. It gives the room a delightful fresh smell. Another very good plan is to add a little disinfectant to the water.

How to Extinguish Burning Oil.

Either sand or flour will extinguish burning oil. It is therefore a good plan to have one or the other of these ready to hand in any house where oil lamps are much used. No account must water be used in case of burning oil, as it only serves to spread the flames and may easily cause a disastrous fire.
