Trimming Horses' Feet.

How to Care For Brooms,

To preserve a broom from becoming damp always hang it by the little device attached to the handle or, in the absence of this, tack on a loop in a convenient place; but, in any event, do not let the straws stand on the floor. A good plan when through sweeping to soak the broom a few moments in warm soapsuds. Shake it thoroughly and hang it up immediately. A broom treated this way will last twice the time of one standing on the floor. When the straws become bent, a broom is very soon rendered useless.

To keep the joints of the hands from getting stiff, after holding the hands in water as hot as can be borne massage them, both the backs and palms, with sweet oil. This should be thoroughly rubbed in. Then dip the hands in hot water again, using soap. Rinse

sore to me, as it is to many another farmer, says a correspondent of Rura New Yorker. In my experience the head of the herd has been the hardest to keep in a presentable state of cleanliness. This has led me to experiment and with good results. First I tried bedding with sawdust, using from two to four bushels per day. This used bedding too fast and did not keep the animal as clean as desired. Then I made a platform of 2 by 3 inch joist, using three pieces crosswise and natiing to these, placing the top ones about three-fourths of an inch apart. This kept the bull clean without bedding much, but was not easy to clean, even though the platform could be taken up. owing to the spaces being so small that straw and the like would crowd in, especially over the crosspieces, and bind. Then, too, it was hard on the animal's knees, as the bedding would work from under them. My last device is the cheapest, and I like it the best. It consists simply of nalling 2 by 2 scantling to the ordinary raised floor, which should be of the right length to accommodate the bull. These pieces are placed one inch apart and are about three feet long, extending from the drop toward the manger. This arrange ment holds plenty of bedding under the fore legs and allows liquids to pass off at once to the gutter, thus keeping the top of the floor practically dry at all times. On such a floor the animal keeps clean and has a good bed under his knees, where it is most needed, at a

small expense for bedding. Carbolic Acid For Abortion When I lived in northern New York, nine-tenths of my cows would abort, says a Vermont farmer in Breeder's Gazette, I tried various treatments, but none was effective. I read about the carbolic acid treatment and directions for using, and it was such a simple remedy that I tried it and never lost a calf after that until a year ago, when I bought a cow that lost her calf other cows began to lose calves. I then began using the same treatment. I use one tablespoonful of carbolic acid to a pint of warm, soft water and put it into a double spray sprayer and give three full sprays on each cow's

hay at noon. A western stockman gives in the same paper the following method of treatment: Put twenty drops of carbolic acid in a bottle with about a pint of water. This is a dose for one cow. To cows in stanchions it is easily and quickly administered. For a few days give it to all the cows both night and morning. When the cows begin to spring, give a few doses to each springer and inject twenty drops of carbolic acid into the womb of a cow that has lost her calf from any cause to guard against possible infection, not forgetting the plnt of water. This remedy has
