# GOOD, SOUND LOGIC.

Platform of Democratic Party and Union Labor.

In his recent speech at the Inopuquo club banquet Hon. E. M. Shepard defined Democratic principles very closely and uttered some truths concerning the intimate relations existing between union labor and the Democratic party. On the subject of organized capital and of federal injunctions he said:

"The Democratic party has never made and will never make an attack upon the freedom of those who have lawfully made fortunes to make them larger. And very certainly the Democratic party, made up in so large part of wage earners, can never be otherwise than loyal to labor organizations or stand otherwise than for their usefulness, their moral and economic necessities, their rights, their general benevolence. \* \* \* I believe the economic efficiency of our own country has been vastly increased and justice promoted by trade unions. They constitute one of the great and conservative forces of our industrial rights. \* \* \*

"Can anything involve more danger to conservative interests than un-American interference with personal liberty, such as was illustrated by the injunction order granted in St. Louis the other day by a federal judge of ability and character? No doubt the judge who forbade persuasion believed there was law for the prohibition. But, if so, then so much law ought to be forthwith repealed. That I believe to be the opinion of wise railroad owners and capitalists as well as of other wise men."

"Now, such a law or use of law as the St. Louis injunction illustrates puts us all in danger and ultimately none more than the right. Their final safety, like the welfare of the middle and laboring masses, is in freedom to speak and write and act about lawful things. Interference with such freedom in our country is revolutionary and reckless."

"Is it anything less than calamitous that in the armory of law weapons should be found to restrain that kind of freedom when this far the armory of law has been ransacked in vain for weapons equal to the prevention of combinations expressly forbidden by statute?"

# PEOPLE OF THE DAY

Keene For a Fight.

Though he hasn't often "run away," James R. Keene has got in the habit of living to "fight another day." About once in so often this most daring of financiers puts on the gloves with another of the big ones in Wall street, and the fur generally flies on such occasions. At present he has a "go" on with the Harriman interests, the control of the Southern Pacific railway being the stake. Mr. Keene boldly states that the fight will be continued and will not end until the Harriman party has been ousted from the control of the Southern Pacific. He does not mince words in his explanation to the finan-

cial world why he has undertaken the present fight. He says that the suit to enjoin the Union Pacific from voting the \$300,000,000 of Southern Pacific stock which it holds in its treasury was not begun by the famous stock pool of which he is the manager, but by himself.

He asserts that the joint operation of the two pools by one set of officers is contrary to the antitrust and interstate commerce laws and that a vigorous effort will be made to set aside the ownership of the Southern Pacific by the Union Pacific.

Several members of the Judiciary committee were gathered in their room near the close of the late session of congress relating experiences when they took their examinations for admission to the bar.

"A member of the committee before which I appeared for examination," said Mr. Littlefield, "was an old judge who had written extensively on legal questions. One of the questions asked presented a problem that had been dealt with exhaustively in a treatise by the judge, and I happened to remember it because the author's name was well by reputation. When I presented my answer, therefore, I took exactly the ground the judge had taken. The old judge looked over his spectacles at me in evident approval. "Young man," he said, "I think you have answered that question very well, very well indeed. I am surprised that so young a man should have so profound a knowledge of the law."

### Glassware.

An authority says that glassware will last longer and look better if the following hints as to its care and preservation are regarded: Tepid water, the best castle or other pure soap and a stiff brush are the first essentials.
