Lord Derby and Major Delmar.
Horses on every where are greatly interested in the match race between Lord Derby, 2:05 1/2, and Major Delmar, 2:05 1/2, which is to take place July 4. It is expected that the contest will take place at Empire City park, Yonkers, N. Y., but the matchmakers have agreed to trot their horses on the track owned by the best bid for the race. Lord Derby is owned by P. E. Smathers. Major Delmar is controlled by his trainer.
