DALLAS STREET FAIR AND CARNIVAL.

For weeks and we the Woodmen of our little city have been working and talking it up until at last they got the outside world as much interested as themselves. Good seed was generously sown and now a rich harvest is being reaped. The town had been cleaned up and many homes and nearly all business houses were decorated for the occasion. Woodman emblems of many kinds are in evidence. Besides a large attendance from all parts of this county there are many in attendance from various other counties and all have enjoyed the occasion. The Monmouth and the Sheridan bands have greatly entertained the proceedings. Refreshment stands are so numerous that the profits in each case are not apt to be large. At 1:30 Wednesday several thousand people were congregated along Main street to witness the parade. The first carriage contained Mayor Hayter and Director general Fiske. Fred West, our county clerk, was a full grown clown. Mrs. Anny Dunn as queen was handsomely arrayed and so were her maids of honor, Misses Vida Guthrie, Annetta Hooper, Nannie Starr, Lulu Locke, Mrs. Jesse B. Evans and Mrs. Nora Craven. As they passed Harry Madison and Harold Hart were attractive little gentlemen. The Dallas, the Monmouth and the Salem drill teams showed off to good advantage and there were a good number of Woodmen in the procession. There was an attractive float containing Miss Minnie Robertson, little Helen Casey and little Mildred Shaw, two sweet children, representing the fact that "my husband was a Woodman." Another quite dilapidated float in which was Miss E. H. Huck and two poor boys, signified that her husband was not a Woodman. Arnold's aggregation of shows made a big and attractive finish to the street parade, which was the best ever seen in Dallas. The Queen and her retinue were escorted to her throne on the large platform in the center of the attractiveness of the occasion. Judge Judah, manager of the carnival to be held in Salem from June 29th to July 4th appeared and in behalf of Salem invited our Queen and her retinue to be their guests during their carnival and the invitation was graciously accepted. Later on the following dispatch came from Astoria: "Her Majesty, the Queen of Dallas carnival, the regatta committee, congratulatory and extend a cordial invitation to visit this city during the regatta as a royal guest." Most likely our queen will go there as well as to the Salem carnival. She will well represent the good name, generosity and cordial hospitality of Dallas, and will be treated by the people of those cities as though a genuine queen. The Salem and the Dallas carnival teams had a spirited contest drill, both showing remarkable proficiency. It was almost impossible to decide which was best but the visiting team was given the benefit of the doubt and awarded first prize. 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
