Georgia Experiment Station. Spraying For Grape Rot. In spraying experiments in Ohio in 1901 for the prevention of grape rot in a commercial vineyard covering more than seven acres seven sprayings were applied at a calculated expense of \$7.10 per acre. The first of these immediately preceded blossoming, and

after the setting of the fruit they were repeated at weekly intervals. While the unsprayed area yielded only 792 pounds, or ninety-nine baskets of eight pounds each, of inferior wine grapes, equal sprayed areas yieided a little more than 300 baskets of fine grapes, which brought \$30.50, includ-

ing baskets. The return per acre from unsprayed area is calculated at 316 baskets per acre, worth less than \$10 per acre, while from the sprayed areas the average yield was 1,252 baskets per acre, worth \$125.20 per acre.

Soda bordeaux mixture used to replace ammoniacal copper carbonate for the later sprayings gave apparently better results than the usual treatment with bordeaux mixture followed by the copper carbonate. This mixture is made from copper sulphate and commercial caustic soda or soda lye.

Bare Branches Not the Thing. There is one very common mistake made by those who are taken with the notion that they must clear out their trees, says H. E. Van Deman in Rural New Yorker. It is that all the small branches, twigs and spurs must be cut off the lower limbs and from the interior of the trees. Bare branches are not the proper thing until the shade of the trees causes them to be so, and by a moderate and judicious thinning of the branches they will retain their spurs for a long time. These often bear good fruit, and they also serve a good purpose in strengthening the growth of the main branches and shading them from the sun.

Advantages of Irrigation Professor Wickson points out the advantages to fruit growers in regions where irrigation is unknown that will come from a supply of water for use in dry years. The saving of a single crop will often more than pay for the outlay necessary to place an orchard perma-nently beyond the reach of dought.

A Moon Blunder.

The new moon appears in the west-ern sky and sets from the moment it becomes visible, but in the "Children of Gibeon" Walter Besant caused a v moon to rise in the east at 2 o'clock in the morning.

Or. Schliemann found bits of glass in his excavations at Maycenæ, though Homer does not mention it as a sub-

stance known in his time.
