The Prune Business.

Last year nearly all prune orchards north of Dallas had fair crops but this season almost every orchard in the county will have a full crop. The Elites, Hayes, Chapman and Parker orchards north of town are in fine condition. Nunn, Butz, Hibbard and Campbell south of Dallas will probably have double as big a turn out as last year. D. P. Stouffer thinks his trees this side of Ballston will yield close to 20,000 pounds of dried fruit. He will erect a warehouse near the spur railroad track here and bring his product here to command a better market. S. F. Kimball has been over from Salem looking after his drying interests and will buy several outside crops. He has bought the 4000 bushels of Mrs. A. K. Wilson and wants as many more. Picking will begin about the middle of September.

Something About Grain.

Nearly everywhere around both the quantity and the quality of the grain is exceeding expectations and the expectations and the price is good enough. At both Perrydale and Rickreall 74 cents was being offered yesterday. Machines being numerous and threshing easy nearly all the crops in this county will be in the sack by the first of September. Martin & Blodgett have threshed for H. C. Fox about 2000 bushels of Durum wheat 800, Loe Bros. 3000, C. D. Purvine 800, Otis Wait, 3000, R. M. Ballard 1800, G. Rempel 1700, Jas. Col 3000, Cass Gibson 1200. Wheat ranged from 20 to 25 and oats from 35 to 40 bushels to the acre. There is more grain and less straw than last year.

Dallas Water Works.

Contractor Gates has twenty men constructing headworks at the mouth of Canyon creek, seven miles up the La Crosse. When that is finished they will begin on the ditch for the pipe line to Dallas. The entire right of way will first be cleared from the source to the reservoir site, a mile west of town. As soon as the big pipe is laid over, that six miles, a 300,000 gallon masonry reservoir will be constructed water for the amount work coming from Canyon creek. City mains and hydrants will then be put in. Six and eight inch iron pipe will be used for the circulating system with smaller pipes for residences. All piping will get both inside and out a coat of hot asphalt before being sunk to the ground.
