### REDUCED EXCURSION Rates to the Seaside and Mountain Resorts for the Summer.

The Southern Pacific company has placed on sale at very low rates round trip tickets to the various resorts along its lines, and also, in connection with the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, to Detroit and the seaside at Yaquina bay. The latter tickets are good for return until October 10th.

Three day tickets to Yaquina bay, good going Saturdays and returning Mondays, are on sale at greatly reduced rates from all points, Eugene and north, on both east and west side lines, enabling people to spend Sunday at the seaside. What is making about 20 bushels to the acre. Not many oats are threshed yet but the yield will probably be a little short. Some of Geo. McCulloch's wheat made 35 bushels to the acre, and Wm. Birks had some cats that made 50. The acreage of grain is smaller than usual, the farmers raising more grass and clover than formerly, depending more on stock and dairying. Quite a quantity of hay is being baled that having proved to be a paying crop last year, good baled hay being worth \$7.50 a ton in the field. Wm. Yocom, Henry Clark and Lincoln Bennett have each erected a silo and are raising a crop of corn to fill them with, thus furnishing green stuff for their dairy cows during the winter. They ship the cream to Portland and get a good paying price. Hops are looking fine and if nothing happens a big crop will be gathered. In most yards picking will commence next Monday. Growers here have been offered 20 cents but are not anxious to sell.
