A dozen men and half as many teams with scrapers are at work on the new mill pond at the Dallas saw mill. The old pond held about a million feet of logs and the new addition will hold two million more feet. Considerable new machinery is on hands ready to be installed.

Kirkpatrick & Williams are having stored in the wooden mill building the product of 170 acres of hops. For several years past it has cost from 6 to 7 cents a pound to get hops marketed but the cost this season is near 10 cents and the present market value is about 20 cents.

Joe Elliott will begin gathering and curing his prunes sometime next week. He has fifty acres of prunes but many of the trees are not yet bearing.

Half a dozen teams are filling the court house yard with dirt being excavated to increase the size of Johnsons mill pond beyond the city park.

S. P. Wilson who was presiding elder of this district when the Methodist church was dedicated, spent last Sunday in town. He is no longer a minister but is traveling for a San Francisco firm.

John A. Williams who lives in the Pioneer settlement has rented from Joshua McDaniel at Rickreall a 150 acre farm at \$350 cash rent and will move to the old McDaniel house as soon as prune picking is over.

Hip Pummer and Manfred Sears are running the H acre Uglow hop yard and have about 50 hands gathering the crop. Robert Gaynor and Haven Smith do the firing. The yard is in fine condition and is yielding well.

Some thrasher owners who had been in years past bothered by hands leaving them before the threshing season was over, guarded against it this year by bargaining that no man should be paid before the end of the season, and if one deserted the machine he was to get nothing.

Mrs. A. B. Enns will begin gathering her prunes next Monday. She and her six daughters will pick them while George Shaw and J. A. Williams will do the drying. Her crop last year brought \$1600 and she has fully as good a crop this time.

There are over 200 acres of hop-around-bridgeport and a dozen crews are gathering them in fine shape. There are not many lice and but little mold has appeared. The recent rain with the cool drying weather that followed, have proved a benefit rather than an injury to the crops.

R. C. Remington and Smith Bros are now picking about 300 bushels of prunes each for the Butz dryer. Mr. Butz will next Monday begin picking his own eight acre crop and has over 3000 bushels in sight for the season run. He will pay four cents a bushel for picking. Boys and girls can gather from 25 to 30 and men and women from 40 to 50 bushels a day.

Leonard and Tude McFee have about 30 hands gathering daily 90 boxes of fine hops as ever grown. They are of a bright golden color but have few lice and the few molded hills were cut down in advance of the pickers. They have been exceedingly careful in both picking and drying and expect a gilt edged article. Robert Judson is yard boss and the drying is done by Ben Thompson and Leonard McFee. The same crew will pick the neighboring Hubbard yard.
