Experiments In Feeding Horses. In a bulletin detailing the results obtained from a series of experiments in feeding horses, the North Carolina sta-tion drawa the following conclusions: Brome hay gave as good results when fed to work horses as timothy hay. Out straw was satisfactory for feeding horses which did light work and for those which were idle. One-fourth more grain was required to support horses doing light work when they were fed straw.

The novel feature in this process is the use of liquid air, the function of which is not fully understood as yet.
