**A French Soldier's Invention.**  
A device for suppressing sound and smoke has been provided for the ordinary rifle by a French soldier. It consists essentially of a steel tube about thirty inches long, with several partitions having orifices slightly larger than the bore of the gun, and this tube is attached in front of the muzzle by a bayonet clamp whenever its use is desired. On firing the gun the gases are retarded by each partition in turn, finally escaping without sound or smoke. With a knife at the end the auxiliary tube can be made to serve as a bayonet.

**For the Removal of Tattoos.**  
Those who have been tattooed and who regret it may, says a writer in Cosmos, succeed in ridding themselves of these marks by the following process: Pour on the tattooed portion a concentrated solution of tannin, then by means of a needle analogous to that of the tattooer prick the surface and then rub hard with a nitrate of silver pencil. There is formed a slough which falls at the end of fourteen or eighteen days, and the operation leaves only a slight scar, which at the end of two months is invisible.

**THE HORSE BREEDERS**  
Some of the essential points to be considered in selecting a draft horse according to an article in American Cultivator, are good feet and legs, plenty of weight, a well developed large body and good style and action. A draft horse without good feet is worthless on any market; hence good feet are the very first essential of a draft horse, or, in fact, any class of horse. The hoofs should be large, round and wide at the heel. They should have width, but not be too deep or too shallow. The horn should be of good quality, as indicated by its density. The wall must be strong and not inclined to be flat. The legs should be well set under the body and possess plenty of substance, as indicated by the quality and amount of bone and the development of muscle on the fore arms and gaskins. Weight is a very essential point. A draft horse should weigh from 1,800 pounds upward, the more the better, provided it is combined with quality and good feet and legs. The body should be deep, wide and strongly coupled, as indicated by the shortness of back and the muscling of the loin. Good action is essential, as indicated by the length of stride, quickness of step and straightway movement. Draft horses weighing 1,800 pounds and upward can be produced by breeding good draft mares, which combine size and quality, to a first class sire of any of the recognized breeds of draft horses, as the Percheron, the Clyde, the Shire and the Belgian. Each breed has its own peculiarities, perhaps advantages and disadvantages. Be that as it may, be sure to select a good sire, one which possesses individual excellence backed up by good ancestry.  
**The Cheap Kind.**  
It costs \$75 or \$100 to raise a colt three years old, or to whom he can earn his living, anywhere east of the range district, says Stockman and Farmer. It follows, therefore, that if there is any money to be made in raising horses they must sell for more than this amount. Every horse that sells for less than \$100 at four years of age is likely to leave his owner owing him a board bill. There is no pleasure in the society of an inferior animal of any

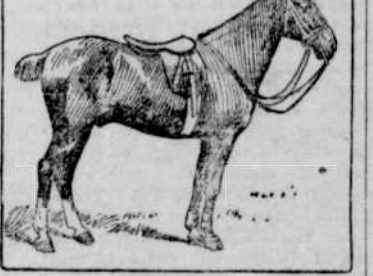

**Experiments in Feeding Horses.**  
In a bulletin detailing the results obtained from a series of experiments in feeding horses, the North Carolina station draws the following conclusions:  
Brome hay gave as good results when fed to work horses as timothy hay. Out straw was satisfactory for feeding for horses which did light work and for those which were idle. One-fourth more grain was required to support horses doing light work when they were fed straw.  
Barley was not equal to oats in feeding value per pound, but was nearly as good. Mules did not relish barley. Corn fed in connection with oats in the proportion of 100 pounds of corn

to 125 pounds of oats had a greater value than oats; 77.5 pounds of corn equaled 100 pounds of oats when fed to work horses.

**English Car Horses.**  
At a recent sale of street car horses in England by a company which has installed other motive power, it is reported that 854 animals brought an average of nearly \$200 each. They must have been much superior to those used on the car lines still operated by horses in New York, although none of the wretched looking street horses of former years are seen now, says Rural New Yorker. Though the trolley and automobile have taken the place of thousands of horses, the demand for prime animals is constantly increasing for heavy trucking, light driving, army and general farm work.

**WITH THE DOCTORS**

Any one who has had experience in the care of the sick knows that it is no easy task to gauge the doses of medicine prescribed by the physician, and perhaps those who perform the duties of the nurse can best appreciate the advantage of the dropping mouthpiece for bottles presented in the illustration. It is formed of a glass tube, with a contracted outlet and an enlargement near the center, in which is seated a glass ball. It is intended, says a writer in the Philadelphia Times, that when the bottle is in an upright position the ball will fall to the center of the contracted portion of the tube and completely seal the opening to prevent evaporation. A rubber sleeve which fits over the rear end of the tube insures a tight joint when the device is applied to bottles of different sizes. The upper side of the tube contains a small perforation through which air enters to relieve the vacuum as the liquid flows out, which action, owing to the contracted opening, takes place only a drop at a time. After the required number of drops have been measured out the bottle is gradually returned to its vertical position, permitting all the liquid to return to its lowest level before the ball leaves its seat in the enlargement and seals the opening. Should the liquid carry the ball be-

found its seat in the outward rush the flow is not prevented owing to the peculiar shape of the tube at the place where the ball finds lodgment.

**Diet in Rheumatism.**  
G. O. Jarvis, says the International Medical Magazine, thus sums up the result of his researches: Allow a liberal meat diet, cooked by being either broiled or roasted, and served rare. Eat carbohydrates in moderation, cooked so as to preserve the salts—that is to say, by frying in an excess of boiling oil—and fats in rather small amounts. Water should be drunk plentifully, and it should be especially directed that some water be taken between meals. Alcoholic drinks, tea and coffee are to be used in great moderation. It is better not to take alcoholic drinks at all.

**Typhoid Fever Serum.**  
A typhoid antitoxin serum invented by Dr. Allen Macfadyen and endorsed by no less a person than Lord Lister is the latest medical discovery, says the Scientific American. Dr. Macfadyen is the director of the Jenner Institute of Preventive Medicine. Briefly stated, Dr. Macfadyen's discovery consists in this. He has found that by crushing the cells of the typhoid bacillus in liquid air the intercellular juices are not only obtained without living organisms, but are also rendered highly toxic. When injected into living animals, these juices produce a blood serum which acts as an antidote against the poison generated by the typhoid bacillus. The novel feature in this process is the use of liquid air, the function of which is not fully understood as yet.
