George Brown Dead.

He was born in Kentucky in 1823 and crossed the plains in 1847. He bought from Linday Applegate a donation land claim and owned it to the day of his death. In 1849 he went to the California mines but soon returned. In 1850 he married Miss Martha Hines of Yamhill county. In 1854 they moved to the Baptist church and were both baptized the same day. For 49 years they have been meek, devout, faithful and valuable members of that church. Three years ago he was stricken with partial paralysis from which he never entirely recovered. After a brief illness he passed away at his home in Dallas last Monday, aged 80 years, leaving a widow, seven children, twenty-two grandchildren and four great grandchildren. The daughters are Mrs. Jane Gist of Clatskanie, Oregon, and Mrs. May Thacker of Sprague, Washington. The sons are William and James of Condon, Edgar, Alvin and Fay all living near the old home place. The funeral was preached by Rev. A. J. Hunsacker of McMinnville, who had crossed the plains with him and they had been intimately associated ever since. Monroe Miller and Mrs. Joshua McDaniel are cousins of Mrs. Brown, and Mr. McDaniel has been a neighbor and fellow church worshiper for over half a century. Uncle George, as everybody loved to call him, was laid to rest in the family burial plot in the Salt Creek cemetery. He was truly a good man in all the relations of life.
