RICKREALL. Mrs. A. Longnecker was quite ill.

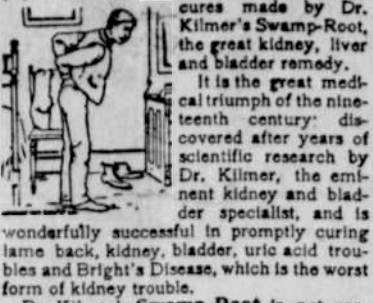
