SCHOOL OFFICERS' INSTITUTE.

Perhaps the most successful meeting of school officers ever assembled in the county was in Dallas last Saturday. Over forty school directors and nearly as many teachers were present. State Superintendent Ackerman told the different objects of school officers' meeting and Frank Butler had considerable to say about teacher's salaries. He may be nothing but a farmer and surveyor but has better ideas about what teachers ought to get for their services than many school professionals. County Superintendent Starr made plain the laws concerning public schools, and City Superintendent Alderman talked sensibly about what a teacher might reasonably expect of a board of school directors. J. R. Shepard, who has been eminently successful with his own business, proved that he knows considerable about educational affairs. Perhaps no one present dissented to what he said as to what school board might reasonably expect of a teacher. The question of heating, lighting and ventilating school buildings was ably handled by Supt. Ackerman, and ought to have good results in different parts of the county.
