Plankington furnished 91, J. E. Miller 248 and Wm. Lee over 400 pounds, and the live turkey weights were Warren Frink 64, E. E. Hart 65, Mr. Cummings 83, W. D. Calkins 124, James Boydston 149, Joseph Gage 156, John Martin 163, Harvey Gage 258, Joseph Brown 359, Henry Glasford 419, H. R. Grant 470 and Dave Grant 645 pounds. The two Grants had 113 fowls. The new Dallas tannery has double the capacity of the one that was burned and the proprietors Muir & McDonald will gradually increase their output until the limit of capacity is reached. They now have in fourteen vats over 800 hides in process of tanning, there being over 300 calf skins in one vat. The bulk of their leather is converted into saddles, some into harness. They have orders from Chicago and Denver and have just filled one from Dallas, Texas.
