

"Statements cent out in the press dispatches from Washington to the effect that the manufacture of oleomargarine

has been increasing in the past few months and that the output will soon be equal to that of last year are not returns to the internal revenue bureau. As a matter of fact, the high water mark of production for the current fis-cal year was reached in December and January, in which months more than 8,000,000 pounds were produced. Since that time there has been a gradual falling off, in April, the last month for which the returns have been made pub-He, reaching only 6,250,000 pounds. Friends of the eleomargarine bill which became a law last session claimed that by forcing the manufacturers and dealers to sell their product for what it really is and not for butter a decrease in the output as compared with pre-vious years would result, and this appears to have been realized. The total output for the ten months ending April 30, 1903, was 64,986,181 pounds as against 99,362,803 pounds for the corre-sponding period of the preceding fiscal year, when the old law was in opera-tion and all oleo, colored or uncolored, was taxed at the uniform rate of 2 cents a pound. The decrease in production is therefore 34,456,622 pounds, or 34.6 per cent. Taking it altogether, the new oleomargarine law from the standpoint of protection to the consum-er may be said to be a success."

A dish drainer was thought out by an invalid whose mind is much stronger than her body. It was so cleverly thought out that it saves at least one-third of the work-the great, great work—of dish drying. The dishes are firmly held at their lower edges in the bottom of the wire basket. They are rinsed on both sides at the same time and do not steam. There is a central bas-ket which holds knives, forks and spoons upright, insuring perfect drainage and preventing soaking and loosening of knife handles. No pretty finger tips are scalded in hot rinsing water.

Renewing Oilcloth. When oilcloth has been down for few months and is losing the shiny surface it can be renewed easily, and it will last twice as long. Melt a little ordinary glue in a pint of water, letting it stand on the top of the oven till dissolved. Wash the oilcloth thoroughly and let it dry. Then at night when the traffic of the day is over go over the whole thing carefully with a flan-nel dipped in the glue water.
