If much stress is to be placed on what numerous republicans from various quarters have to say about the harmonizing love feast at Independence Saturday night and Sunday morning, the effects will be far other than was intended. Polk county is a poor territory, to thus bring all the brethren into line.

In case our prohibition leaders insist upon putting a ticket in the field this spring, how many of the rank and file who want their votes to count something will insist on casting their votes where they may help to keep some unworthy man out of office. That would be practical common sense action in the matter.

Judging by the recent Independence banquet one might reasonably conclude that the would be leaders and molders of opinion among Polk county republicans believe in plenty of something to drink and not allowing it to spoil. But we cast no such slur on the bone and sinew of the party for they are as honorable, high minded and pure in their lives as any others in this county or anywhere else. Such elements may seem to harmonize on the surface but wont stay mixed.

In speaking of the efficiency of present democratic county officials we asked upon what grounds could the republicans claim that their entire ticket should be elected and the Enterprise replied because they were in the majority and had in the party as good men for office as could be found outside of it. True they outnumber the democrats and have plenty of good and capable men, but conventions which are generally packed in one interest or another frequently fail to put up the best ones. Over and again the best republicans in the county have rebuked such action by voting for better men put up by the democrats.

A majority of the voters of this county are naturally republicans and inclined to support republicans for office. Perhaps half of them are party slaves and always vote as the party bosses dictate, that is go the ticket straight without considering the merits or demerits of individual candidates. But as repeated experience has shown a big percent of them have minds of their own and support merit rather than party. If the democrats in any given case put up a better and purer man than the opposition candidate lots and lots of republicans will vote for him. The advice of the party leaders to stick to the ticket dont count in this county. Common sense and personal freedom say vote for the best men.

PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the secretary of state of the state of Oregon has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of section 1 article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violation of provisions of this act," approved February 24, 1903, the State Prohibition alliance duly filed in his office on February 5, 1904, an initiative petition containing 8,816 signatures properly attested thereto, and certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed law, the tenor and effect of which is hereinafter particularly set forth, providing for elections in any county or any precinct therein or any subdivision thereof, or any subdivision of a county consisting of any number of entire and contiguous precincts of such county to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in such county or subdivision thereof, or any such precinct, and for other purposes as hereinafter stated, shall be submitted to the legal electors of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held on the 6th day of June, being the first Monday of June, 1904.

Now, therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, governor of the state of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act, hereinafter mentioned, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the state of Oregon, announcing that the said state prohibition alliance has filed said initiative petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached, demanding that there be submitted to the legal electors of the state of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held on the 6th day of June, being the first Monday of June, 1904, a proposed law providing for elections in any county or precinct therein or any subdivision thereof, or any subdivision of a county consisting of any number of entire and contiguous precincts of such county to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in such county or subdivision thereof, and for other purposes connected therewith and hereinafter stated, having for its purpose and effect following, that is to say:

A bill to propose, by initiative petition, a law providing for elections in any county or any precinct therein or any subdivision of a county, consisting of any number of entire and contiguous precincts of such county, to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in such county or subdivision thereof, and for other purposes connected therewith and hereinafter stated, having for its purpose and effect following, that is to say:
