After congratulations and a fine lunch the bride's cake was cut. The warm friends of both parties sent telegrams and letters of congratulation from various quarters. Mr. Howe was raised here but had several years been in Alaska and is now merchandising with his father Henry Howe, at Whatcom, Wash. Miss Whiteman has been a popular and successful teacher, having taught the same school at Shaw, in Marion county, for three years. They at once left for her new home, followed by the best wishes of a multitude of friends. Besides many relatives on both sides there were a dozen friends of the bride over from Marion county to take part in the happy occasion.

DEATH OF E. C. KEYS.

After many months of gradual decline he passed away at his home in Perrydale Feb. 17th, aged 76 years. He was a native of New York, and crossed the plains to California in 1850. The next year found him near Eola in this county, with less than a dollar in his pocket. For a considerable time he and Thos. Pearce made rails or did anything else for a living. He took up a 160 acre donation and built a log cabin thereon but sold out in a year or so. In 1853 he was married to Miss Susan Kemp, who died in 1855 leaving a child, who is now the wife of G. W. Myer. Miss Amanda Doty became his wife in 1859 and is now the bereaved widow. Their four sons Laurence, Henry, Edwin and William, and daughter Fannie, live at Perrydale. Mrs. Lena Scroggin at Sheridan and Mrs. Nellie Wise in Idaho. Many years ago Mr. Keys began to accumulate land around Perrydale and was finally the owner of over 4000 acres nearly all of which had been divided among his children. He was a man of but few words and at tended strictly to his own business. Strict economy, hard work and good judgment laid the foundation of his fortune. He never engaged in speculation but acquired all his possessions by straight out farming. Last Friday he was laid to rest in the Bethel cemetery. His pastor, Rev. Arthur Cain, preached the funeral before a large as semblage in the Christian church and told of his many quiet, good qualities. A special motor took about fifty Dal las friends down to show their final respect to his memory. He did many deeds of kindness but was always averse to talking about it.

G. W. McBeck and wife attended the funeral of her father, J. J. Leabo, in Marion county last week. He was 75 years old and had lived in Clackamas county for many years.

PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the secretary of state of the state of Oregon has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of section 1 article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violation of provisions of this act," approved February 24, 1903, the State Prohibition alliance duly filed in his office on February 5, 1904, an initiative petition containing 8,816 signatures properly attached thereto and certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed law, the tenor and effect of which is hereinafter particularly set forth, providing for elections in any county or any precinct therein or any subdivision thereof, or any subdivision of a county contiguous precincts of such county to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in such county or subdivision thereof, and for other purposes connected therewith and hereinafter stated, having for its purpose and being briefly of the tenor and effect following, that is to say: A bill to propose, by initiative petition, a law providing for elections in any county or any precinct therein or any subdivision of a county, consisting of any number of entire and contiguous precincts of such county, to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in such county or subdivision thereof or in such precinct; providing for the filing of petitions for such elections and the form and effect thereof, and for notice of such elections and for the time and manner of holding and conducting the same; declaring what shall constitute a subdivision of the county within the meaning of this law; declaring what acts shall and what shall not constitute a violation of this law; declaring the qualifications of petitioners and of electors at such elections; applying to such elections the provisions of sections 1900, 1901, 1902, 1903, 1904, 1905, 1906, 1907, 1908, 1909, 1910, 1911, 1912, and 1975 of Bellinger & Cotton's Annotated Codes and Statutes of Oregon; providing for printing and distributing ballots for such elections; prescribing the duties of public officers in relation to such elections and in relation to the enforcement of the provisions of this law; providing for the issuance by the county court of orders prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors within certain limits and declaring the duties of such courts in reference thereto; limiting the time within which the question of prohibiting such sale of intoxicating liquors may again be submitted to vote in the same district; providing penalties and punishment for the violation of any of the provisions of this law; providing for the return to any liquor dealer or other person of a proportionate amount of any license which he may have paid, when the district in which he shall be engaged in business shall be declared to be prohibition territory; and applying to all elections held under the provisions of this law the provisions of the general election laws of the state and declaring certain rules of evidence applicable to prosecutions under this act.

Done at the Capitol at Salem this 10th day of February, 1904.
