Nearly all prominent business men throughout the land are pleased with the supreme court decision that the great eastern railroad merger is unlawful. It will prove a severe blow to illegal trusts and unlawful combinations and stimulate legitimate competition.

The recent testimony of Mormon witnesses before a congressional committee, has brought out many things the people of Utah did not know, they having been kept in the background. But few knew that polygamy was still practiced by many of the leaders, in spite of national and church laws to the contrary. The end is not yet.

The democratic central committee will meet here tomorrow and set the time for primaries and county convention. Because so few names have been mentioned as prospective candidates is no sign that democrats are asleep or discouraged. There is but little probability of an unworthy man offering and still less of one being nominated. But if by chance such a mistake is made let it be corrected by voting for a better man for the office.

It is now assured that the Lewis and Clark exposition will get a generous congressional appropriation and that at least a majority of the eastern states will send their St. Louis exhibits of this year. The size and importance of our fair will be greater than its most ardent supporters had expected. Nor is it a matter of chance, for quite a number of the shrewdest and most aggressive and progressive men of Oregon have spent much time pushing the affair before congress and throughout the east.

J. R. SHEPARD DECLINES.

The prohibition county convention in Dallas March 5th nominated J. R. Shepard of Zena for county judge and all who knew him well at once said that no better man could be chosen for that or any other office in the gift of the people. When notified of the nomination he declined it and gave his reasons for taking no part in the present prohibition campaign. He said that for ten years he had adhered to the prohibition party, vainly hoping that all enemies of the saloon would rally under its banner. During all that time the great mass of them failed to see it as the prohibitory did and he can not now see the least probability of such a change. They are praying for the defeat of the saloons in this county but he believes their present course is having exactly the opposite effect. It will have a strong tendency to defeat the proposed local option law to be voted on in June. He says the other parties are almost equally divided and concedes that the prohibition strength of 200. With that 200 votes out of their way the saloon element would spot every candidate known to be in sympathy with local option and defeat him, making it uncooperative in this county even if it became a state law. More than that he reasons that the party managers would conclude that they had lost the temperance vote and would bid for the saloon support. He advises a withdrawal of the ticket from the field and that all of said vote be cast for men known to favor the law and who would enforce it if passed. Thus he says they would vote as they have been praying. As Mr. Shepard is known to be strictly honest, a man of remarkable good judgement and very successful in business, considerable stress should be placed on his opinions.
