J. N. Havi, chairman of the republican central committee has been confined to his home with la grippe for several weeks.

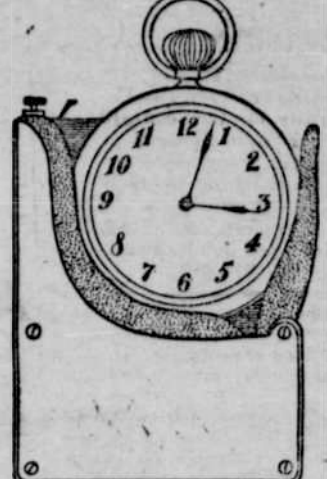
Rodney Coulter bought at Sheridan a blue span of very Percheron horses and no more attractive team is seen in our streets.

SAFETY WATCH POCKET.

Ingenuous Device For Outwitting Pickpockets.

From the time of the ancient scheme of the pocket full of fishbones to the every inventor of a scheme for outwitting pickpockets seems to have attempted to prevent the thief getting his fingers into the pocket or to have tried to bar the removal of the contents by securing them in some way, to the interior or by injuring the fingers of the thief. But then it immediately begins to make up for lost time, as the watch is no sooner withdrawn than the spring arm, which gripped one side of the timepiece, flies shut and starts a bell ringing with noise enough to be heard clearly in the immediate vicinity. The chances are ten to one that the thief has not had time to get the watch safely stored away before he has sprung the alarm and caused his capture with the goods in his possession.

HOW TO PROLONG LIFE.

Rules Laid Down by a Member of the Royal College of Physicians.

The question of the possible extension of human life has recently been renewed consideration by a British scientist, says Harper's Weekly. In a lecture delivered before the Royal College of Physicians in London, Sir Hermann Weber, M. D., F. R. C. P., pronounced certain conclusions which he had arrived at as to the best means for prolonging life. The main points in his advice were comprised in these prescriptions:

Moderation in eating, drinking and physical indulgence.

Pure air out of the house and within.

The keeping of every organ of the body as far as possible in constant working order.

Regular exercise every day in all weathers, supplemented in many cases by breathing apparatus and by walking and climbing tours.

Going to bed early and rising early to six or seven hours.

Daily baths or ablutions according to individual conditions, cold or warm or warm followed by cold.

Regular work and mental occupation.

Cultivation of placidity, cheerfulness and hopefulness of mind.

Employment of the great power of the mind in controlling passions and nervous fear.

Strengthening the will in carrying out whatever is useful and in checking the craving for stimulants, anodynes and other injurious agencies.

Bullet Proof Clothing.

The Italian government is negotiating for the purchase of an invention for making bullet proof uniforms. The new armor is apparently a sort of felt, the stuff being capable of adaptation to any form whatever—for example, a breast piece with a collar or a sort of coat which completely envelops the wearer and absolutely guarantees him from gunshot wounds. The thickness of the protector varies from one-sixteenth to seven-sixteenths of an inch, according to the arm the effects of which it is designed to destroy. Against the armor of seven-sixteenths of an inch the regular ordinance revolver with steel covered ball is powerless and also the gun of the 1801 model charged with smokeless powder.

Fattening Turkeys.

For fattening turkeys pen them, give them plenty of water and sort over the potato bin and take those unsuitable for the table and sell a lot of them and mash them, mixing with them an equal bulk of cornmeal. Make it stiff, and cook enough at once to last a week. We don't know of any food that will fatten a turkey or any other fowl faster than this.—Farm and Ranch.

FRUIT AND FLOWERS.

LIME, SALT AND SULPHUR.

The Pacific Coast Spray Proves Satisfactory in the East.

Interest in the lime, salt and sulphur spray of the Pacific coast as a remedy for San Jose scale in the east began to be general last season, and the experiments made in various states at that time have placed it on the footing of an efficient remedy for the eastern states.

Entomologists Parrott and Houser of the Ohio state station says that the lime-sulphur-salt wash has proved to be well adapted to the needs of many orchardists in Ohio and will occupy an important place in spraying operations in the future. The extensive tests that have been made by practical men have demonstrated that the lime-sulphur-salt wash is the strength usually recommended, not only efficiently controls the San Jose scale, but is besides of much value

In holding in check the peach leaf curl. The results secured by the tests were so highly satisfactory that even the most skeptical were convinced of the efficient qualities of this wash for the spring treatment of these two destructive pests of the peach orchard. As a consequence many more orchardists are going to use the wash this spring.

The formula that has given most general satisfaction in the preparation of the wash is as follows: Sulphur, 50 pounds; salt, 50 pounds; sulphur, 50 pounds; water, 150 gallons.

Place the full amount of lime in the kettle or vat, or whatever the receptacle may be, and start it to shake with hot water, using enough to prevent the lime from being slaked, but not enough to drown it. During the slaking process add the sulphur, all lumps having been first pulverized, and the salt. Stir both of them in thoroughly and add water gradually to reduce the mixture to this paste. If the mixture is not already boiling, bring it to this point and allow it to boil for one hour.

If the wash is prepared in an iron kettle it will be necessary to add a bucket of water now and then to replace that lost in the boiling process, and to stir the mixture frequently to prevent burning and caking of materials upon the sides of the vessel.

After one hour's boiling enough hot water should be added to make the required amount of mixture, or if cold water is used the proper proportion should be added and the wash again brought to the boiling point. The wash is now ready for use. It should then be emptied into the spraying barrel, being strained through common wire screening, and if possible applied while hot to the tree.

THE CHERRY.

Essentially a Home Fruit, but Worthy of Commercial Culture.

The cherry is probably grown less for commercial purposes than any of our other orchard fruits, not because the profits of growing it are less, but because the fruit ripens in midsummer and requires more work to harvest than any of the other fruits. The cherry is what might be called a home fruit. The tree is small growing and naturally ornamental and appropriate to plant in house yards and near buildings.

The demand for the fruit is staple, and it is very seldom that a glut in the cherry market is heard of. It is a fruit that has been neglected by commercial fruit growers and deserves to be much more widely planted.

In a lately issued monograph on cherries in Iowa Professor Price and Little of the state college include an extensive and interesting study of varieties with

numerous illustrations. Among these is Orel No. 23, or Early Maroon, of the Monticellian group of sour cherries. The fruit is described as round, medium sized, brilliant red, with small stone, quality good, buoyant and slightly astringent; season about the same as Early Richmond. This variety has been widely disseminated throughout the west by Professor Budd and has proved to be productive and early. It deserves to be planted.

Handling Strawberries For Exhibit.

In picking fruit for St. Louis the best picker should be assigned to this work and should go over the patch or field ahead of the others. In picking strawberries each berry should be wrapped separately and laid in the box carefully placed so that all will be close enough so that they cannot move, but not tight enough to mash or bruise. Pint boxes should be used, but if not obtainable place a layer of cotton in the bottom of the box, a layer between each layer of berries, and more on top of the box. Crates should be marked so that expressmen may know what each contains. The fruit should be picked green enough to be firm, even if it is still inclined to be white on tip. So advises G. L. Holdinger of the Kansas State Horticultural society.

FRUIT FLOWERS

THE LOVELY COLUMBINES.

Delicate Orchid-like Flowers and Elegant Foliage.

Aquilegas or columbines will grow almost everywhere, and they should be found even in a city garden, for their delicate, orchid-like blooms are invaluable for cutting. The columbine is a most desirable plant in all its varieties. It forms large clumps, blooms early,

long and abundantly, is quite hardy and elegant in habit. The seed may be sown in the open ground in the spring, preferably where the plants are to grow, and they should be thinned to a foot apart, or to secure a good display of flowers the following season they may be sown in the fall, or good clumps of seedlings may be planted at that time. Most of them thrive with ordinary garden culture. The varieties cornuta and chrysantha do best in well drained, partially shaded spots.

Aquilegia coronata, the Rocky mountain blue columbine, is called the finest of all, its sepals dark blue and petals white. Chrysantha has golden yellow blossoms, with very long spikes. Skinneri, the Mexican columbine, is very handsome and quite distinct, the sepals and long, crimson and light green.

There are also many beautiful hybrids in pink and white, creamy yellow and pure white, which are quite as lovely as the typical plants.

The foliage of the columbine is elegant and very useful in arranging bou-
