SOME of our democratic brethren, failing to find any weak places in the republican ticket, are attempting to find fault with the convention and the management of the campaign. This shows what dire straits they are in. The people cannot be hoodwinked by any such talk. They are not called upon to vote for the managers of the campaign nor for the managers of the convention.

The democratic campaign cry is "vote for the best men, regardless of politics." By repeating this statement and then insinuating that the democratic candidates are the best men, they hope to elect a portion of their ticket. They have failed, however, to point out wherein any democratic candidate is better than his republican opponent. Republicans are willing that the voters of Polk county shall vote for the best men, for they are to be found on the republican ticket.

The term of U. S. senator J. H. Mitchell ends in 1907. The state senator elected from this county on June 6th next will help elect his successor. Mr. Laughary favors the re-election of Senator Mitchell. A vote for him means a vote for Senator Mitchell. A vote for Mr. Hayter means a vote against Senator Mitchell.

The question before the voters of Oregon is not an unimportant or trifling peculiarity or defect of a nominee for county judge or justice of the peace. The question simply is as to the support Oregon wishes to give to the republican policies in force and the republican president in power. A man may think that his choice involves no more than a personal preference for one local candidate against another; but if so, he is mistaken. His vote against the republican nominee is not in the largest and truest sense against that nominee, but against republican policy and against President Roosevelt. The world will little care nor long remember who is sheriff or prosecuting attorney here, but important in history will be the verdict the American people bring in for or against themselves this November, and whatever forward or backward impulse is given that verdict by the vote of Oregon in June. Let there be no misapprehension on this score. A service for Roosevelt is not a divided ticket or heavy majorities on some nominees and reduced majorities on other nominees, but a sweeping victory with increased majorities all along the line. The above from the Oregonian is peculiarly applicable to Polk county. There is not an unfit or unworthy candidate on the republican ticket in this county; hence the democratic cry "vote for the best men" falls to the ground of its own weight.

M. Scrafford.
Republican candidate for sheriff, needs no introduction to the voters of Polk county. He has been a resident of this county ever since 1866. Prior to that time he served two and one half years in the Union army. After arriving in Polk county, Mr. Scrafford taught school for several terms, and then settled down to farming, which occupation, together with hop raising, he has followed ever since. He has always been prominent in the councils of the republican party, and active in his support of a republican cause. As sheriff, Mr. Scrafford will be vigilant in the apprehension and detention of criminals; will carry out the law, which requires a sheriff to settle with the county treasurer once each week; and during busy times, such as the tax collecting season, will so conduct the office as to accommodate the largest number of people in the shortest time.

E. M. Smith.
Republican nominee for county clerk, was born in Polk county, and comes of pioneer stock. He is a graduate of the Oregon state normal school at Monmouth. Since leaving school he has taught a number of the best schools of the county, being at this time the principal of the Beth-el public school. To prove that Mr. Smith has made a success as a teacher it is only necessary to ask his pupils and patrons, for they are his most ardent supporters. He recognizes the principle that a public officer is the servant of the people and as county clerk will always be found at his post of duty, painstaking in his work, and courteous to all who have business with the office. Mr. Smith is conscientious in all his undertakings, loyal to his friends and a true republican.

William Riddell.
Nominee for county commissioner on the republican ticket has lived in Polk county for many years and is one of our most successful farmers. In fact he has made a success of everything that he has undertaken. Such a man will certainly make a success of the county business. Mr. Riddell believes in economy in public affairs, in an equitable distribution of county road funds, and advocates the construction of permanent roads as far as possible. The interests of the taxpayers will be carefully guarded by the election of Wm. Riddell as county commissioner and Ed. F. Coad as county judge.
