CAPITOLA, CALIFORNIA.

Thursday evening May 12, there left Portland in a special car thirty-four young women from Multnomah, Clatsop, Washington and Oregon, bound for the Young Women's Christian Association at Capitola, on the seashore 100 miles south of San Francisco. While enjoying the grand scenery through the mountains we composed and sang delegation songs and told laughing stories. At Santa Cruz springs there was a wild rush for mineral water and an exciting scrambling back into the car as the train pulled out. At Benicia a train of eleven cars was divided into two sections and both of them taken across the bay by the largest ferryboat in the world. We left the train at Oakland for a trip through the beautiful grounds and attractive buildings at Berkeley. Saturday evening brought us to Capitola, which is unsurpassed except as a summer resort for wealthy people. There is a large and fine hotel surrounded by over 100 one room white cottages for such guests as do not care to room in the hotel. Flow-ers are everywhere clambering over the cottages. The hedges of calla lilies are especially beautiful. On one side of the picturesque are clustered the huts of Italian fish men, who start out at three o'clock in the morning to haul in the nets which have been casting fish for the guests of the hotel. Each spring the hotel is rented for two weeks for our conference. In the hotel now are over 200 girls from six states and representing many colleges and city associations. The mornings are given to the work of the association and the afternoons to rest and recreation. Almost every afternoon there is a party or picnic on the beach, on the cliff overlooking the bay or in the pretty little glen back of the village. The genuine, refined christian fellowship in connection with this meeting will be apt to carry a good influence throughout many years to come. I was one of a party of six girls from various north western colleges who, with Miss Shields, traveling secretary of the association, and her father made a trip to Pacific Grove and other places of interest. Noon time brought us to Pajaro railroad junction where we had to wait for some time. Looking around for something to eat we found the only place to be where a sign said that larger beer could be had for 5 cents, sandwiches and coffee for 15 or a meal for 25 cents. Knowing that we would get no supper we marched in and had the novel experience of eating behind the bar for the first time in our lives. Our next stop was at Pacific Grove, where the Young Men Christian Association holds its conferences. There the boys camp in tents and hold their meetings in a church. Numerous tents were stretched over wooden frames, had plank floors and were about as comfortable as houses. There we had a talk which carried the eight of us and started on what is called the seven mile drive, said to be one of the most attractive drives in the world. We soon came to a tall gate guarded by a pretty little lodge, surrounded by flowers, it being the home of the gatekeeper. We now entered a forest of beautiful pine trees and soon came to the cypress trees which are the same as the cedars of Lebanon mentioned in the bible. These trees grow only in the Holy Land and at this place. Next we came to a stretch of road over which we kept in sight of the ocean for seven miles. At one place the driver drove out to a point from which we could look down into what is called the Restless Sea, caused by the waves coming at right angles to each other. Near this we could see seals basking on sunny rocks and others bobbing up their heads up from the quiet pools around. At one place we found a quaint little Chinese shell booth kept by a shy little china girl with

a long pigtail. The driver warned us not to buy very many shells as we could pick them up on the beach just ahead. Coming to the place the telly stopped, we got out and scrambled along the beach and soon returned loaded down with pretty shells. After leaving the sea and winding through green valleys we came in sight of the picturesque old town of Monterey, which was the first capital of California. We soon came to the first house built there, it being a tiny adobe. Close to it stands the first lumber building erected in the state, the lumber having been brought from Australia. A little way down the street we found the Sherman rose, which has a romantic history. While stationed there General Sherman, who was then of low rank and without much notoriety, fell in love with a Mexican senorita, who was very handsome. When he had to leave he gave her a rose bush saying that if it lived and grew he would come back and marry her. The rose did grow and is now a big tree, but Sherman never returned. The senorita is now old and gray and it is said that she believes she still lives and will some day come and claim her as his own. We had the pleasure of seeing her but as she spoke no word of English and we no Spanish, the interview was not very satisfactory. When Miss Shields parted to her and said: "You Sherman's" she replied "si, si" which means yes, yes. We went to the old custom house built by Spain, Mexico and the United States. At the corner was the flag pole where the first U. S. flag was raised in California in July 1846. Up on the hill beyond is the monument erected by Mrs. Stanford in honor of Padre Junipero Serra, who landed at Monterey in 1770. Driving through the town we saw the old theatre erected in 1847, being the first on in the state and Jenny Lind having sang there. On another street is the old Washington hotel, where all the great men used to stay when they went to Monterey. It looked odd and bare like with its plain walls and tiny windows. Here we are at the quaint old San Carlos mission founded in 1774. It has a chime of bells and there is a rose garden at one side. We next drove out to Hotel Del Monte, which is one of the finest in the world. Its grounds comprise 126 acres, much of it finely cultivated but some parts charmingly wild. The hotel has over 400 rooms all as fine as any can make them. One of the interesting features of the grounds is the cedar maze. It looks simple enough from the outside, but once inside it is almost impossible to get out without a help. After going through the hotel and its grounds we drove back to Monterey and took the train for Capitola, all voting it one of the finest, happiest afternoons we had ever known. After the conference closed I spent a day in beautiful Santa Jose with the Cooper and Crater families and forenoon with Miss Nellie Cooper in the state normal school from which she is to soon graduate. As a student she ranks high and is prominent in young people's society work. Enroute to San Francisco I dropped off at Stanford University and saw many attractive things in connection with that celebrated school. I had been having too good a time to keep strict account of my cash account. Before taking the train for the 772 mile journey to Portland I discovered that my purse contained only 20 cents and two postage stamps, but the other girls shared their lunches with me and I came through all right.
