SOME WHISKY FACTS

THE DEVIL'S HOLD ON THE UNITED STATES SHOWN BY STATISTICS.
Enough Money Spent For Liquor Every Year to Pay Off National Debt. Five Times as Much Goes For Drink as For Books and Magazines.
The capital stock of all the national banks in the United States is \$84,000,000. Every year the people of the United States spend nearly twice that amount for liquor, says the "American Prohibition Year Book For 1904." The total amount of deposits in all the savings banks of the United States is \$2,000,000,000. Nearly half that amount is spent every year for liquor. The total national debt of the United States, less cash in the treasury, is about \$570,000,000. Every year enough money is spent for liquor in the United States to pay it off and leave an enormous surplus. The total value of all the farm products in the United States in 1903 was \$3,000,000,000. The annual drink bill is more than a third of that amount. The total bonded debts of all the states and territories is about \$177,000,000. The drinkers of the United States could pay all these debts with the money they spend every two months.

Fading Hair

The curious thing about this philanthropic attitude of the promoters is making money. The business of turning old established bars into coffee houses is paying a big dividend, and envious publicans regard it as a miracle.

Paris Students' Temperance League.

The students of the Latin quarter of Paris or at least a certain number of them are getting up an anti-alcoholic league, which will form part of the French League of Temperance. The members only abstain from distilled liquors, but drink all fermented beverages, such as wine, beer and cider. The fees for admission and membership are a franc for each member, and the league intends to use every possible means of impressing on the public the importance of temperance, such as posters, advertisements, tracts, hospital propaganda, temperance restaurants, and later the establishment of a journal.

Six Hundred Victims a Week.

"More than 600 persons are killed weekly in this state by drink," said the Rev. William N. Yates in an address recently delivered before the Women's Christian Temperance Union in Philadelphia. The time is nearing when the saloons, like the theaters, will be closed to stop the wholesale loss of life."

THE MARRIAGE QUESTION.

The professor who announced that "love and romance die out with the sound of the wedding bells" was the first to start the ball rolling. It would seem a brave woman who marries with this echo in her ears, yet we have not heard that there were fewer marriages during the year. There are unhappy married lives, but a large percentage of these unhappy homes are due to the illness of the wife, mother or daughter. ANTIALCOHOLIC SALOONS.

Lord Grey's "Trust" Demonstrates Its Efficacy.
Lord Grey gives some interesting information about his "anti-alcoholic" saloons, which have been established throughout England, in a letter to the London Times. There are now 314 "saloons" maintained by the Earl Grey trust, and a hundred additional houses will be acquired as soon as the present leases expire. No attempt is made to combine religion with temperance.
A "trust" saloon is managed exactly like any other saloon—or public house, as it is called there—with the exception that you cannot get alcoholic stimulants. The barmaid or barmaid is on duty, and she bar is attractively fitted up, but it supplies "soft" drinks, with a strong leaning toward tea and coffee.

Health Fads on the Brains.

To get all sorts of health fads on the brain is a disease in itself. It is a very prevalent disease too. With a few foolish quacks to observe, a whole lot of hygienic rules to adjust to and a schedule of superstitious sanitary notions diligently followed by day and dreamed of by night, is a malady which begins as a mental derangement and ends in a complete physical fizzle. No room left for a spontaneous life, no place for free, joyous liberty. Not a minute's space for rollicking disregard. Everything fixed, every minute disposed of, introspections without number. Prehensions, misgivings, hovering vaguely about the mind, like flocks of carrion crows. Such a life is not worth living.—Medical Talk.

Victoria Was Exclusive.

When Queen Victoria visited any of her subjects it was by no means a matter of course that people staying in the house should have the privilege of sitting down at table with their august fellow visitor. It was her majesty's custom not only to take with her to the house where she designed to "lie" (as the old phrase was) for a night or two her own bed and bedding, carriages, horses and servants (including occasionally her cook), but also to confine herself at meals to the company of her own suite, sometimes inviting her host and hostess to join her at luncheon or dinner.

Russian Soldier Choirs.

A French writer in describing the Russian soldier says that it is a pleasure to see a detachment of improvised musicians marching at the head of cavalry singing with the full strength of their lungs to the accompaniment of fagotets and clarinets. Music plays an important part in the life of the Russian soldier, from the regiments of the guard and the famous Preobraschenski regiment, with their bands over a hundred strong, to the regiments on service in remotest Asia and the dreary Pamirs, with their improvised choirs.
In addition to these improvised bands each regiment has at least one "funny man," who with his caperings and jests beguiles the tedium of the march. It is said the Russian infantryman prefers to do without his instrumental music rather than his singing men. That is not surprising, considering that, with the exception of the grand old and a few favored regiments, the music of the drum is the sole instrumental music he is privileged to hear.

Rapid Typewriting.

An official stenographer, Deming, at Albany, years ago reported court proceedings on a typewriter at the rate of 150 and 170 words a minute. He eliminated the vowels, using consonants only, with a dot to separate words. His typewriter was incased in glass to deaden the noise. The paper was run into the machine from a roll. Lawyers could read the notes.
