THE HOP BUSINESS.	
The recent rains added a big per cent to the probable output and the quality will perhaps be better than ever before. But few lice have appeared anywhere and almost no spraying has been done. Beginning 40 years ago on a small scale this state has gradually become the most important hop producing section in the union. There are thought to be 25,000 acres in hops in the Willamette valley. Up to about ten years ago the average price was 15 cents; then an over production in all countries brought it down about half that or less. Some 20 years ago there was a great scarcity and the article went up to \$1 a pound in California, Washington and New York the hop output is decreasing, while in this state it is increasing, its crops being equal to that of all other states combined. Here hops can be put in the bale for 8 cents while it costs 12 cents in New York and 15 in Europe. Our average yield ranges from 800 to 1,000 pounds to the acre. Bottom lands yield heavier but are more liable to injury than upland hops. Some growers are expecting to get picks at from 40 to 45 cents, but except in poor, inconvenient yards, the standard rate is apt to be 50 cents. Most owners of good yards have their crews now engaged. It cost over a million dollars to gather and cure the 1903 Oregon crop which netted the producers over \$3,000,000. Over 20,000 persons spend the month of September gathering our hop crop and nearly a million pounds a day are cured. Everybody looks forward with pleasant anticipations to the hop picking season for it is a semi-picnic during which men, women and children all have good times and earn good wages.
