Turkey being strongly inclined to treat Uncle Sam unfair the latter sent a fleet of war ships to that country and then she quickly came to time.

The tendency is to begin picking too early to avoid damage by rain. Some hops will be picked at a cent a pound but most of them at 50 for nine bushels.
