FROM NEWPORT.

Last Friday morning the editor, his wife and daughter, took Dimick's cross country express and made close connection at Derry for Corvallis and the seaside. When the train left Corvallis it was full of people from many quarters bound for Newport. The trip across the mountains and down the Yaquina river presented constantly varying scenes. None of the towns are very large nor were any signs of a boom in evidence, but the people seem to have an abundance of home raised things on which to live. Near Nashville a thumping and bumping was heard, the train stopped and all hands piled out to see what was up. Two wheels of the baggage car were off the track but the train crew soon had them back. It seemed that the whole population of Toledo were out to greet us. It is the center of what will some day be a fine country. At 6 o'clock we rolled into Yaquina city, which is the end of the road, and found the trim little steamer Richardson, ready to take us over the five mile saltwater ride to Newport. Yaquina once had a considerable population, a fine wharf, a big warehouse and a steamship line to San Francisco; but the entrance to the bay became treacherous and large seagoing vessels quit coming in. After spending a large amount of money trying to make it a safe harbor, the government abandoned the project. Long jetties were constructed on both the north and south sides of the entrance to the bay and extending well out to sea, but they failed to sweep out such a channel as had been anticipated. Small coasting steamers still come and go but no large ones. Originally Newport expected the railroad to be extended to that point and to become a smart city, and its population rapidly increased. But as its prospects decayed and the boom went down its population diminished and today on the bluff with a splendid view of the bay and ocean stand many deserted houses that were once quite attractive. Here we go gliding down the bay in a stiff cool breeze. Most of the men have changed their dusters for overcoats and the ladies have donned their heaviest wraps for we are within half a mile of old ocean and the sudden change from the warm valley weather makes it feel like nearly Christmas time. It is no exaggeration to say that fully 1000 persons were along the wharf to see who was coming. As the boat slowly edged up to its landing place there were numerous greetings between it and those on shore. Everybody seemed glad to see everybody else. Most of those who had been at the resort for some days or weeks were commonly dressed and had complexion almost as brown as Indians. Half a dozen wagons were there to take baggage to the camps and cottages at Nye Creek a mile away over a big hill. The Abbey House is right at the landing, the Bay View House just across the street and the Ocean House not far away, and they are all overflowing with guests as well as many temporary boarding houses. Nearly every one walks, even to the lighthouse, five miles away up the coast. Most of the business houses are on the main street facing the wharf, and there is no lack of anything that coasters might want, nor are the prices much higher than out in the valley. The hotels generally charge \$10 a week and a nights lodging almost anywhere costs 50 cents, but those who have an eye to economy can manage to live on much less. A few years ago there

When the tide is out some go and dig rock oysters from their beds of almost solid stone, while others hunt for water and moss agates and other pretty rocks washed ashore by the ever recurring waves. Several stores polish and keep for sale all kinds of stones, shells and other sea things. This season that thing is overdone and all of them are selling at reduced prices.
