From S. P. and C. & E. P. points to the Seaside and Mountain Resorts for the Summer.

On and after June 1, 1904, the Southern Pacific in connection with the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, will have on sale round trip tickets from points on their lines to Newport, Yaquina and Detroit at very low rates good for return until October 10, 1904.

A Monster Steer.
Sixteen years ago the late Dennis Jeffers, of near Hopkins, owned a steer that weighed 3,330 pounds. The animal was a monstrosity. He was not fat when weighed, but was simply big all over, being eight feet tall. Mr. Jeffers meant to fatten him and place him on exhibition, but without any warning the steer lay down and died one night. His hide was saved and is now in St. Louis. The son of Dennis Jeffers, has been able to send some of the bones to St. Louis to be exhibited along with the hide. Mr. Jeffers is a cooper and the skeleton that is still in a good state of preservation. The steer is considered the largest framed one that ever lived, and it is said that if the skeleton had been preserved entire it would now be worth \$10,000—Kansas City Journal.

Fattening Lambs.
The lambs from the Woodland farm of Joseph E. Wing & Bros. sold in the Buffalo market for \$7.40. That price for range bred lambs that weighed only forty-eight pounds last November is suggestive. For thirteen years the farm has been mainly devoted to feeding lambs. Gradually there has grown up a system of successful practice, and the making of lamb mutton has become a less expensive operation. These lambs were the product mainly of silage and alfalfa, much quantity of corn to round them off. They nearly doubled their weight in the feeding.—Breeder's Gazette.

Box Stalls For Mares.
A mare should be well accustomed to the box in which she is to bring forth her young. None especially is this true of young mares with their first foals. A roomy box stall is the best foaling place. If a mare has been worked regularly or off and on all winter her work should be continued almost up to the day she is due. At all events, she should be most carefully watched and nursed with perfect safety be worked until she begins to "slacken away" when she may be retired, but given a good chance to take abundant exercise. With a roomy box and a large yard she will get along very well. By no means let mares run to gether at such times.
