Henry Hill Dead.

He came from the east in 1847 and took a donation claim where Independence now stands. In 1851 he married Miss Martha Virgin, who lived near Rickreall, and in 1868 laid out the town of South Independence. He owned a large body of land south of the town, about 100 acres of it now being in hops. He died last Monday aged about 80 years, leaving three sons and a daughter. He was a quiet plain everyday farmer who attended carefully and strictly to his own business, and never sought publicity. No other man about the place would have been so much missed. As a special mark of respect all business houses were closed during his funeral.
