However much we may wish it were otherwise, it is a fact that the Christian church of the future will be a church of the future.

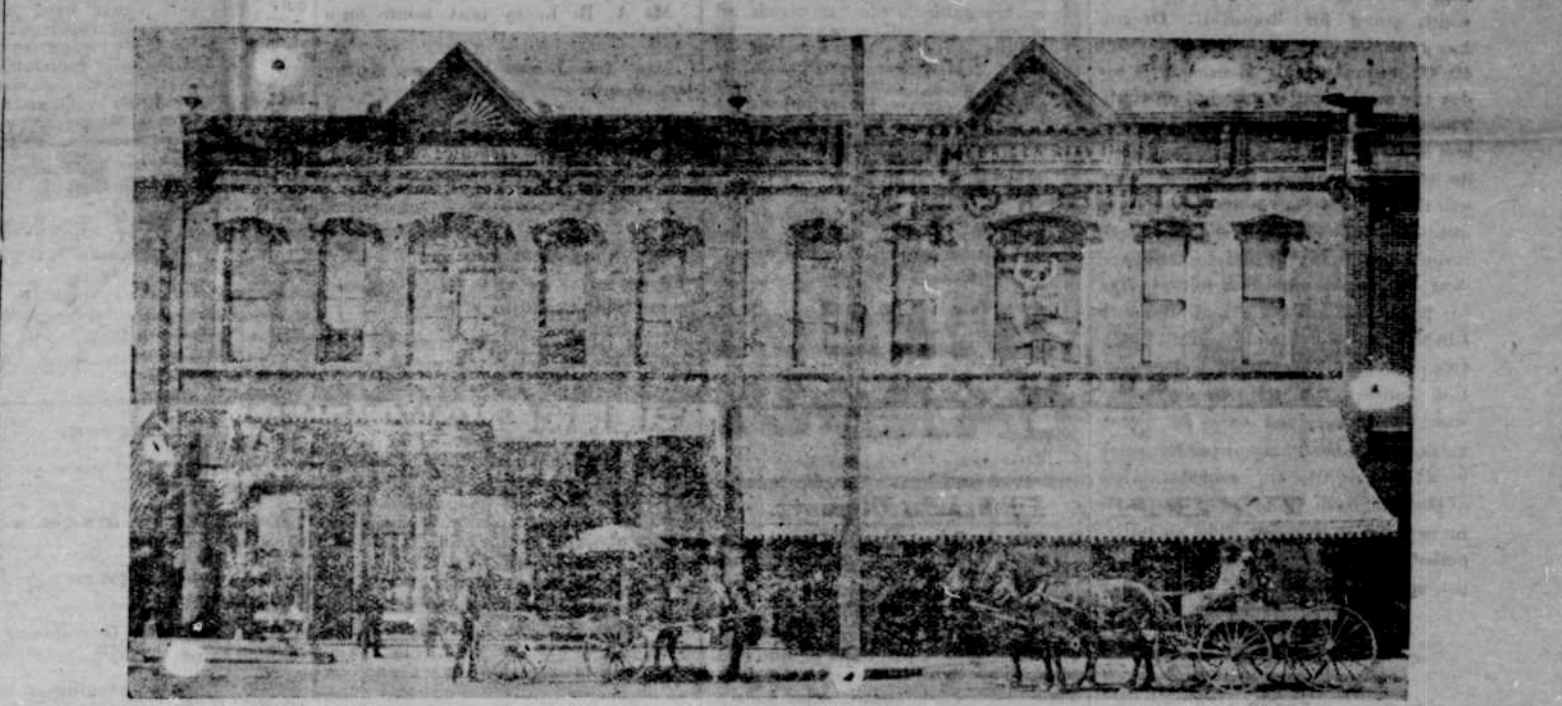
