OFFICERS' ASSOCIATION.

Perhaps the most important and far reaching thing done at last Saturday's meeting of school officers was the formation of an association with Wm. Grant as president, C. L. Starr secretary and ten vice presidents. The county is divided into ten sections, including neighboring districts and each section is in charge of a resident vice president. Each section is to have at least one school officer meeting during the year. The Zena section consists of Popcorn, Lincoln, Lone Star, Spring Valley and Zena districts with J. R. Shepard as the resident vice president. The McCoy section includes Etna, McCoy, Perrydale and McCoy districts with S. L. Stewart in charge. With Rickrell district as a center are Dallas, North Dallas, Folk Oakpoint and Smithfield under the oversight of G. W. Myer. Around Fella City as a center are congregated Oakdale, Liberty, Guthrie, Bridgeport, Oakhurst, Hazel Dell, Rock Creek and Sugarloaf, with Frank Butler at the head. T. W. Brunk will preside over the Eola section consisting of West Salem, Greenwood, Eola, Oak Grove and Brush Creek districts. In the Buena Vista section will be Sever, Parker, High Independence and American Bottom districts with J. M. Prather in the lead. R. A. Campbell will have charge of the Salt Creek section including Ballaton, Concord, Pioneer, Salt Creek Enterprise and Upper Salt Creek districts. With Harmony as a center and J. K. Guttery in charge will be the Red Prairie, Buell, Gooseneck, Buell, Williamina, Scroggins and Lower Mt. Creek districts. The Elkins section
