The Legislature.

It will convene Monday, January 9, and will consist of 90 members, 30 in the senate and sixty in the lower house. Lawyers will predominate in the upper and farmers in the lower house. From this county Senator Loughery is a merchant, Representative Cooper a banker and Representative Fawcett a farmer. Dr. Lee Steiner, formerly of Dallas, will represent Lake county. As usual there will be many lobbyists trying indirectly to secure special legislation or such as would favor corporations or monopolies. As there is an increasing sentiment against saloons and gambling, the friends of those evils will be on hand to stay the tide. The session is by law limited to forty days. The democratic will be so few in number that about all they can do will be to assist the minority of republicans in holding the other level.
