NEW EVANGELICAL CHURCH.

It has been completed at a cost of
about \$6,000 and will be occupied for
the first time on New Years day. All
the parish is good and the work an-
tastical. It is heated by a furnace.
The audience room, which is 45x59
feet, is seated with solid oak pews,
that cost \$708 and the Sunday school
room which is separated from it by a
partition that rolls up is 27x36 feet
and is seated with chairs. The tower
is 12 feet square and stands 60 feet
high. The handsome pulpit was do-
nated by J. C. Winter, a cousin of the
pastor, who also drew the plans for the
building. The pulpit chairs were
donated by the Junior Endeavors and
the organ was furnished by the Sun-
day school. The ladies aid society
procured the carpeting at a cost of
\$200. There are six beautiful mem-
orial windows that cost about \$250
one was donated by the Christian En-
deavor society, one by C. H. Hogg, in
honor of a deceased daughter, one by
Mrs. E. Weaver in memory of her
husband, one by C. P. Poling as a mem-
orial to little Rudolph, and another by
Mrs. Buerer as a memorial to a de-
ceased son. There are three stair
steps for entrance and egress. Elec-
tric lights will be used and all drain-
age will run into the city sewer pipes.
Both inside and out the building is
attractive, an ornament to the city
and an honor to its builders. Next
Sunday there will be three services, at
11, 3 and 7:30. Presiding Elder Pratt
of Portland, and Presiding Elder Bal-
lentyne, of this district, and perhaps
Rev. G. H. Phelps, of Dayton and Rev.
J. Bowersox, of Portland, will be per-
son. There will be a number of speak-
ers at the afternoon meeting. Special
music has been prepared for all the
services and everybody is invited. At
10 o'clock the Sunday school and at
6:30 the Christian Endeavor meeting
will be held in the new Sunday school
room.

The Cont Show.

union where an annual Angus goat

that raise more goats than Polk county.
This county raises more goats
than any other in the state and has
more registered flocks. The next an-
nual exhibit will occur here January
19th and 20th. There will be no en-
trance fee and stock feed will be fur-
nished free. Registered goats will be
in one class and unregistered in an-
other, and 45 prizes will be given in
each class. Free space will be given
for exhibits of sheep and poultry. An-
imals will be shipped at half price and
the railroads will give round trip tick-
ets for one and one-third fare.
