PORTLAND EXPOSITION NOTES. A car load of Cuban things will be on exhibition. Different counties are arranging for attractive exhibits.

Over a million persons are expected to attend the fair. An additional building with 90,000 feet of floor space has become necessary for exhibits.

The American inn is to be located on the grounds and will contain more than 600 rooms. Statuary valued at \$250,000 has been secured from the Lewis display and will be a grand attraction.

A \$35,000 fraternal temple will probably be erected on the grounds by the secret societies of the whole country. Traveling men are thinking of erecting a handsome pavilion as headquarters for all commercial men while in Portland.

One building will be devoted to exhibits from the East Indies, Corea, Siam, Turkey, Egypt, Persia, Japan and China, and another to things from England, France, Germany, Italy, Denmark, Russia, Hungary, Belgium, Austria, Sweden and Switzerland.

Guid's lake, within the exposition grounds, is spanned by bridges aggregating over 2,000 feet. It will be filled with various kinds of fresh water fish and 50 candle power incandescent lights will be placed at the bottom of the lake on each side of the bridges so that people can see them swimming about. Indian canoes, propelled by red men, will make it appear as when Lewis and Clark were here a century ago.
