The legislative bill creating a whipping post for wife beaters is not a bad one. The brute who would whip his wife deserves to be degraded to the lowest degree.

Ex-Governor Geer has retired from the editorship of the *Salem Statesman*, his successor being Isaac Manning, who has had considerable newspaper experience.

Polygamy has been given so many black eyes through the courts during several years past that it is thought to be on the last legs. The younger generation of Mormons are all opposed to it.

A bill is before the legislature authorizing county school superintendents to dispense with the annual county institutes this year so that all concerned may attend a grand interstate educational convention at Portland during the exposition.

The bill introduced in the legislature by Senator Langhary for a Monmouth normal school appropriation is now before the committees on ways and means. It calls for an increase of several thousand dollars more than the last appropriation, the additional amount being urgently needed.

A few months ago it was supposed that the mass of the republican party were opposed to the tariff revision, but now all the indications are the other way. The president and a host of the strongest men in his party have concluded that it is high time to even up many of the tariff inequalities and the democrats are of that opinion. The Oregonian has taken a strong stand on that side of the question.

In case the four state normal schools are retained they will probably all be put under one board of regents with a uniform course of study. Many prominent educators are greatly in favor of it. The new state board would consist of four members, one from each of the counties in which a normal school is located. It would greatly reduce the expense of management. Bills have been introduced in both houses to abolish the normal schools and another bill to do away with those at Drain and Weston.

Besides the war with Japan, Russia now has a momentous rebellion on hand at home. Several million of previously oppressed laboring people have concluded that they can stand it no longer and are striking for liberty. Many have been killed and many imprisoned but that dampens not their ardor. The government is doing its best to quell them but the number is continually increasing. So far it is only a rebellion but the outcome may be a revolution and a less despotic government. Almost the whole outside world is in sympathy with the down trodden people of that aristocratic government.

FINE COAT SHOW.

The most successful exhibition of Angora goats ever held in this state ever held in this state was held in Dallas last Thursday and Friday. There had been five previous shows and each year there has been an improvement in the quality of the stock shown. Polk county has today more high grade goats than any other county in Oregon, and the exhibition of a year hence will show a continuing increase of quality. The committee of arrangements, U. S. Grant, W. A. Ayres, H. L. Fenton, G. W. McBea and J. A. Riddell had every thing in a neat and pleasant shape and the several hundred visitors greatly enjoyed the occasion. At last 100 ladies and as many children were there Friday afternoon. There were 65 registered and 45 grade goats entered. The Obys brothers, of North Yamhill and L. A. Dean, of Riddle, were the judges, and in many cases they were very difficult to decide as to the relative merits of animals. They were strangers here and entirely impartial. In the registered class on doe kids born before March 15 '04 the premiums went to Riddell & Sons and U. S. Grant, and for doe kids born after that date the Riddell, M. B. Grant and W. A. Ayres got the prizes. The best yearling does were exhibited by Riddell & Sons and Gilbert & Patterson, and the best two year olds by Wm. Riddell, U. S. Grant and W. A. Ayres. The premiums on three year olds went to Wm. Riddell, U. S. Grant and Dr. Farley, while the ribbons for four year olds were taken by U. S. Grant and the Riddells. For best doe of any age Riddell & Sons captured all three ribbons, and for the best flock the Riddells and U. S. Grant got awards. U. S. Grant had the best buck born before March 15, '04, while the Riddells came in for second and third prizes. The Riddells took three prizes for buck kids born after March 15, '04. On yearling bucks U. S. Grant and L. A. Guthrie came out ahead, while E. L. Naylor, of Forest Grove, and Gilbert & Patterson took the two year old premiums. On three year old bucks, John Farley and Ed Naylor were the winners, and on four year olds Wm. Riddell and G. W. McBea were successful with two year olds. The three year old doe premiums went to L. A. Guthrie, J. M. Farley and G. W. McBea, and the four year olds to G. W. McBea, Morris Hughes and H. L. Fenton. The best does of any age belonged to L. A. Guthrie and Dr. Farley and the best flocks to H. L. Fenton and Morris Hughes. The prize for buck kids went to Jas. Sykes, for yearlings to I. G. McBea, H. L. Fenton and Morris Hughes, and for two year olds to Ben Thompson. Ben Thompson had the best three year old buck, while G. W. McBea, Vincent Thompson and H. L. Fenton took the sweepstakes ribbons. On Cotswold sheep Wm. Riddell and W. G. Gilliam took first and Wm. Duerr second prizes and on Lincoln sheep both Mr. Gilliam and Mr. Riddell got first premiums, the judge being D. Evans, of Monmouth. John Castle gave all the prize prizes to Fred Koser's fine Berkshires. The poultry display was not very large but what it lacked in quantity was made up in quality. The judge was Elmer Dixon, of Oregon City. On Plymouth Rocks, M. B. Grant and O. E. Dennis each took three premiums, on Buff Rocks, H. L. O. Dennis took several prizes and so did Dr. Crider on White Wyandottes and the White Wyandottes of J. C. Stingley captured a number of premiums. The Rhode Island Reds of T. B. Rowell were beautiful and so were the Black Minorcas of F. A. Stiles, I. A. Allen and J. W. Lewis. Walter Muir had some pretty White Leghorns and E. Hayes some nice Buff Lehighs. The Brown Leghorns of C. L. Shaw and I. V. Lynch well deserved their premiums. The Black Bantam Red Game chickens of Ed Dunn were much admired. Dr. Fink had a coop of beautiful Cayuga ducks and his big bronze turkeys belonged to Mrs. Riddell and the Boydstons. The pretty eagles pigeons belonged to Nola Dimick and George Fuller.

The council say they cannot compel the marshal to stop gambling in the saloons even though he knows it to exist. This statement is made to correct wrong impressions made on the minds of many of our best citizens.

EXPOSITION NOTES.

The Alaskan display at the Portland exposition will be the most complete ever made. That land of snow and ice has far greater mining and agricultural resources than is generally supposed. Every part of that vast region will be represented. The gold and copper ore exhibit will fill a case 75 feet long and 5 feet high. The individual display of the Treadwell mine will show that in 22 years it has produced over \$22,000,000 worth of gold being over three times the original cost of the country. The salmon industry and that in skins of fur bearing animals will show up surprisingly well. The native fruits and berries and the grain and garden vegetables will compare favorably with most grown elsewhere. The canoes, baskets, headwork and photographic scenery will be quite attractive. The present population is about 56,000 about half of them being Indians.

For Better Roads.

Never before was there such a demand for better roads in this country. In years past many efficient road engineers have neglected their duties and almost through away large sums of road money. Before this year's improvements were appointed there were urgent requests from all over the country for the appointment of genuine rustlers who could handle men and get the greatest possible amount of road work done. Half a dozen now ones were selected who are expected to rush things and bring good results. Some who were retained must have more and better work done or step aside. Half of the road money in each district is to be spent there and the balance will go into the general fund to be used where most needed.

Scarlet Fever in Town.

Last Friday it was found that there were several cases of scarlet fever in town and precautionary measures were at once taken. All homes where it existed were quarantined and prominent notices posted. The public school has been closed all week and parents warned to keep their children close at home. Vera Hasbrouk, daughter of Mr. Nettie Hutton, died Saturday aged 9 years and of Wednesday Stanley Matheny fell a victim to the disease. There are not many cases and as the contagion does not seem to be spreading, it is believed that it will soon cease. Families cannot be too cautious in such cases.

Normal School Appropriations.

The friends of the four normal schools have combined and expressed their wants for the next two years as follows: Monmouth for maintenance \$35,000 and for dormitory \$55,000. Drain for maintenance \$25,0
