An effort is being made in the legislature to do away with the state fair appropriation this year and pass a bill authorizing the purchase of the Patton residence as an executive mansion.

The steamer Elder, which has been running between Portland and San Francisco for many years, ran into a submerged rock near Kalama and was seriously damaged nearly all the cargo being ruined by water.

News from the east and from the foreign countries indicate that the situation is decidedly in favor of western hop growers. The world shortage is an actual fact. Those who hold the balance of the hop crop can command good figures for it and the coming crop is bound to sell well.

The piping for the hop houses will cost about \$1000, nearly 200 kegs of nails and over 500,000 shingles will be required.

In Salem wheat is selling at 80 cts. per bushel, clover hay \$12, Timothy hay \$14, bran \$22, shorts \$24, eggs 25, chickens 9, ducks 10, turkeys 14, fat hogs 5, apples and potatoes 50, hops 30.

A new card game "Trail" which can be used to play seven different games three scientific, two educational and two purely entertaining, is now on the market. Meisners have just received a supply.

Among those who will graduate from the normal on Tuesday evening, Feb. 7th are Dean Butler, Velma Ground, Clara Ireland and Bertha Reese, of Monmouth, Fred Crowley, of Oak Grove and Eva Wash, of Dallas.

Prof. R. F. Robinson, who is supervisor of the state educational exhibit at the Lewis & Clark fair has been here advising with Supt. Starr about the exhibit from this county, and the work along that line will be actively pressed.

Nearly 400 bills have been introduced in the legislature, over 150 in the senate and about 240 in the lower house. Almost invariably legislative bodies undertake too much and it is a blessing to the people that so much of it fails to pass.

The Watkins saw mill at Falls City, became so deeply involved in debt that the property was conveyed to George Gerlinger, as trustee for the creditors. He may run or sell the property as his judgment dictates and devote the proceeds to the payment of its debts.

Several years ago some 25 persons took up uncultivated land in the Silez county with the expectation that it would soon be enriched. It is still in the same condition, they not being sure of the boundaries of their land cannot safely proceed to make improvements.

Many county assessors from all over the state are holding a convention in Portland. They will recommend to the legislature the abolishment of the poll tax and a uniform rate of assessment throughout the state. Various things that arise in the experience of assessors were under consideration.

The Women of Woodcraft convention for the district comprising the Willamette Valley and Portland will meet in McMinnville on February 15th to elect delegates to the grand circle at Los Angeles in April. Dallas circle has named these ladies to attend: Mrs. V. F. Elsie, Mrs. J. C. Gaynor, Mrs. Frank Kerklake and Mrs. G. N. Cherrington.

Letter to the Public and Others.

Having been criticised because of my attendance on a case of scarlet fever and those responsible for my attendance being unjustly censured, I wish to say that the facts in the case do not justify criticism. I am more than willing to have the character of my services in this case compared with the previous attendant. This was the first case of roseola reported as scarlet fever though many others of the same kind existed. Why this case was so reported as soon as I began attending it and before I had a chance to report it as such is a mystery. The case was under my care only a few hours and was a hopeless one when I was called. It was thought to be roseola and tonsillitis, but I did not concur with that diagnosis and at once expressed my opinion as to the nature of the disease. Lack of space now forbids discussion of the relative merits of medical and osteopathic treatment of such cases, but at any future time I will be ready to do so either through the press or personally with whoever deems osteopathy as unable to cope with such ailments. I have won legislative recognition in half the states on its merits alone in spite of the counter efforts of the medical profession and I am not afraid that its reputation will in anywise suffer from the sneering remarks of doctors in this vicinity, considering the lack of skill or knowledge exhibited in this epidemic of scarlet fever. I will give fifty dollars for evidence that there is any drug, chemical or serum or combination of the same that will cure, or even shorten, the course of scarlet fever. What is true of scarlet fever is practically the case in all diseases and I can prove it by the best authorities.

NeSmith County.

It is proposed to carve a new county out of Wasco and name it after J. W. NeSmith, who held more positions of honor and trust than any other citizen of Polk county ever did, who sleeps beside the LaCreole at Dixie. He came here in 1843 and in 1845 was made supreme judge of the territory. He was captain of a company of soldiers in the Cayuse war and in 1853 he became United States marshal. He was a colonel in the Yakima war of 1855 and in 1859 was chosen superintendent of Indian affairs. In 1860 he was elected United States senator for six years and in 1872 was sent to congress. No other name for the state is more deserving of public recognition.
