The legislature decided to do away with the state fair for this year but voted it \$15,000 with which to make improvements before its 1906 session. The people of Salem were greatly opposed to giving up the 1905 fair, but the general outside opinion was that on account of the Portland exposition it would be best to hold over for a year.

In speaking of the members of the legislature the Salem Journal says "they were a clean and moral lot of men, economists in their way of living and saving their own money." That the majority of them were clean and moral is evident from the votes they cast. The liquor business and its attendant evils were given many black eyes. Would that all members of all legislatures was as clean and moral as the men above referred to.

The local option law voted by the public of Oregon at the last June election has proved so detrimental to the drunkard making interests that the whiskey sellers used herculean efforts in the recent legislature to have the law so amended as to be less injurious to their business. The proposed amendments all seemed to inposed the surface but a close inspection showed them to be in the interest of liquor sellers. For six long weeks the friends of whiskey tried to overrule the expressed will of the people but at last the bill was indefinitely postponed. One prominent agent of the whiskey ring admitted before a legislative committee that they had spent \$140,000 in trying to defeat the local option measure. The constant tendency of the liquor traffic is to ruin men and make unhappy homes. Vast harm but no good whatever comes from it.

Nearly all the hop yards are ready to be plowed.

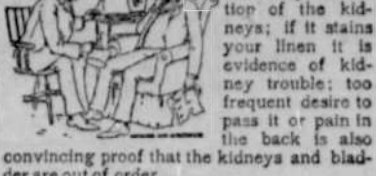
Mr. Simpson is to move from here to near Albany.
