Poling will come to Dallas while M. J. Ballantyne will have charge at Bridgeport in connection with his presiding eldership.

Meeting of Presbytery.
Presbytery of Willamette met here Tuesday, Rev. W. T. Wardle acting as moderator. After devotional exercises there was an excellent sermon by Rev. H. N. Mount of Eugene. Rev. T. P. Howard of Corvallis was chosen moderator. Rev. E. J. Thompson of Independence, served as stated clerk, and Rev. S. M. Bush of Corvallis, as press reporter. Wednesday forenoon and afternoon were taken up by a great variety of church work and various committees were appointed. The attendance was large, there being many prominent ministers and laymen present. It was decided to make the missionary field more nearly self-supporting. For lack of time and room we cannot enter into details. The Presbyterial Missionary society met at the same time. Devotional exercises were led by Mrs. J. G. Van Ordel, and Mrs. Alice Koser gave the address of welcome. Mrs. G. E. Porter, of Brownsville, was president and Mrs. A. O. Condit, of Salem, secretary. There were some twenty delegates from abroad and many Dallas ladies attended and enjoyed the exercises. What was said and done shows that the ladies of the church are doing their full share toward making humanity better. The evening exercises were along missionary lines. J. B. Horner, of Corvallis, told of women's work and Miss Julia Hatch, who is field secretary, brought gleaming from over the state and over the world. Mrs. S. M. Bush, of Corvallis, spoke of many doors that are open for missionary work and Mrs. C. H. Campbell, of Portland, gave a report of the finances in connection with missions. Miss Kate Hanna, of Eugene, a returned missionary, was an interested visitor. Among the delegates were two former Dallas pastors, Rev. George Gillespie and Rev. L. Green.

To Extract Flower Essence.
Any little girl may make perfume in the following manner: Place a layer of the flowers in a clean earthen pot and over them a layer of fine salt. Repeat the process until the pot is filled, cover closely and place in the cellar. Forty days afterward strain the essence from the whole through a cloth by pressure. Put the essence thus expressed in a clear bottle and expose for six weeks in the rays of the sun and evening dew to purify. One drop of this essence will communicate its odor to a pint of water.

Obituary of Mrs. F. H. Conkey.

She was born in Connecticut in 1841 and when sixteen years of age came to California by way of the Isthmus of Panama. She lived with her sister at Auburn until 1862 when she was married to Wm. W. Conkey. Her husband died here in 1893. Two years ago she moved to Independence where her daughter, Carrie, and son, George, were living. For some months she had been in very poor health and tried medical remedies in vain. As a last resort she underwent a surgical operation at Good Samaritan hospital in Portland and died there April 7. On Monday Rev. W. T. Wardle preached her funeral at Independence and the remains were brought by motor to Dallas and taken to the Odd Fellows cemetery where they were laid beside her husband. She was a prominent member of the Methodist church and a large delegation from the Independence and Dallas lodges escorted the funeral procession to the cemetery and assisted in the burial. Mr. and Mrs. Conkey united with the Dallas Presbyterian church in 1891. She was calm and quiet to the end and without agitation or display was firm in her convictions. She led her own life in her own way, in the fear of God and in obedience to duty.

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
