INEBRIATE MANIACS.

A STEADILY INCREASING DIVINE IN THE ARMY OF THE INSANE.

Mysterious Disease, Brought Not Only by the Intemperance of the Subject, but by the Operations of Ancient Drunkenness.

Psychologists and students of mental science, says Dr. T. D. Crothers, the well known alienist, have long been

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aware of the presence of a new division of the army of insanity, a division which is steadily increasing, more mysterious and obscure than the ordinary insanity, and a class of the most fascinating physiological and psychological interest. It consists of inebriates.

"They appear in law courts as both principals and associates in all degrees of crime and are called drunkards, tramps and dangerous classes. In conduct, character and motive they constantly display many prominent symptoms of insanity, such as mania, delusions, deliriums and imbecilities. Yet public opinion refuses to recognize these symptoms because they are associated with intervals of apparent sanity in act and conduct.

"Clergymen and moralists teach that these cases are simply moral disorders growing out of a heart deceitful and desperately wicked" and only remedied by moral and legal measures. Scientists who study the history and progress of these cases find that they are diseases, following a regular line of march from definite causes on certain stages of growth, development and decline, the same as in other maladies.

Many theories are urged to explain the presence of this army of inebriates, one of which asserts that inebriety is evidence of the moral failure of the age, of the increasing wickedness of the times, of the triumphs of the growth of evil over the good, etc. Another theory assumes that the great increase in the manufacture of all forms of alcohol and the facility with which they are procured will fully explain the presence of this class.

A third theory considers them the defective, worn-out victims of this crushing, grinding civilization; the outgrowth of bad inheritance, bad living and the untimely, who are slowly or rapidly being thrown out of the struggle.

Inebriate maniacs are practically "border land" lunatics, meaning persons who move up and down on the border line between sanity and insanity and, when studied closely, divide naturally into many classes. One of these classes, which in most cases represents extreme chronic stages, appears prominently in the daily press in reports of criminal assaults and murders.

When the genesis of the crime and the so-called criminal are studied, unmistakable symptoms of mental unsoundness appear. In most cases the victim is a neurotic by inheritance and growth. In other words, he is born with a defective brain and organism, and both growth and culture have been imperfect.

Many and complex influences, of which alcohol or other narcotics are prominent, have prepared the soil, furnished the seed and stimulated the growth of a positive disease of the brain. The higher brain centers have slowly succumbed to a paralysis as mysterious as it is certain in its march. The victim's capacity to comprehend his condition and adjust himself to the surroundings becomes less and less, and he is more and more a waif, drifting with every possible influence.

In appearance, head, face and body are angular and imperfectly developed; the nutrition is defective; the eye, the voice and every act and movement indicates degeneration and disease.

Any general history of the crime reveals delirium, hallucinations, delusions and maniacal impulses. Thus, one day the papers recorded the following among other cases of this class: An inebriate, of previously quiet disposition, killed his wife, supposing she had put poison in his food. Another man in a similar state shot a stranger who differed with him on the age of President Roosevelt. Another man killed his father, who remonstrated with him for overdriving a horse.

Still another assaulted fatally his brother, who would not give him money. Two men, both intoxicated, mortally wounded each other in a quarrel as to who should pay for the spirits drunk. Another man killed his wife and child, supposing the former was going to desert him.

Thus day after day the records of these inebriate lunatics appear, and each case is as positively the act of a maniac as if committed by an inmate of an asylum whose insanity was long ago adjudged. In each case a long premonitory stage has preceded this last act. The individual history of almost any inebriate furnishes abundant evidence of this.

Take No Chances.
In taking strong drink of whatever name there is great danger: it is bad for the health; it is dangerous to good morals; beset of bad tendencies; it is a bad example for others; no one in all the world was ever harmed by avoiding it; millions and millions of men and women and children have been ruined in health, in morals and character and life because they did not avoid strong drink. Let all your influence be against this great evil, a greater danger to those who do not avoid it than any other.

FOR THE CHILDREN
Master of the Drawbridge. Is a game that requires little preparation. With a sharp stick a strip of ground about nine feet wide and about twenty feet long is marked off. This represents the drawbridge of the castle of Sir Montgomery of Skye. One of the players is the warrior of the castle gate. He stands on the bridge. Harvest Months of the World.
Excepting the months of November and December, harvest is always going on somewhere in the globe. In January reapers are busy in Mexico, Argentina, Australia and New Zealand. Harvest is in full swing throughout the East Indies in February and March. April sees the fields of Mexico, Egypt, Persia and Syria being reaped. The merry month of May is thus used in Morocco, Belgium, California, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Sicily, Greece and part of southern France reaped in June. The greater parts of the United States and France, Austria and southern Russia are reaped in July. August is the harvest month in England, Germany, Holland, Belgium, Denmark, the northeastern states of America and part of Russia and Canada. Scotland, Sweden, Norway, the northern midlands of Russia and the greater portion of Canada are glad to shear in September. And October beholds the reapers in the most northerly districts of Russia, Norway and Sweden gathering, with endless trouble their scanty crops.

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DRINK, ENGLAND'S CURSE.

The True Cause of Her Loss of Commercial Supremacy.

Robert Polson Murray, an Englishman who has lived many years in Canada, contributes to the Contemporary Review an article entitled "The Housekeeper Under Protection," the main purpose of which is to prove the high cost of living in a protected country in comparison with that in England. But she takes occasion to combat on other grounds the idea that Great Britain can regain the supremacy which she declares has been captured from it by any modification of the free trade policy.

She credits this loss of supremacy to various causes and gives examples of the pedantic and medieval manners and methods that are adhered to in business. She speaks of the hindrances of a feudal system of selling and leasing property for industrial occupation, the slavish worship of rank, the depressing climate, the backwardness of education, lack of skill in advertising and the degrading tendency of the sale and payment of premium to secure positions. But she says the chief cause of industrial decay in Great Britain, the real ghost in the cupboard, is without any doubt whatever the great national hobby—drunkenness.

The direct expenditure upon this last year she declares was \$180,000,000, about \$125 per family, plus the cost in poor rates, homes, refugees, police, prisons, hospitals and asylums for the devotees of the habit. There are 12,000,000—about one in four of the population—who are in direct poverty, too incapable for anything, even for anarchy; men and women who stand around the streets of the large cities by the hundred thousands, bold, bloated, dissolute, black-eyed, shifty, dishonest, degraded, debauched, never sober except by accident, incapable of self respect and content to dwell in dirt and rags indescribable. The writer contrasts this with the sober, thrifty and industrious 6,000,000 of Canada.

UNHAPPY IRELAND.

Its Possibilities Swallowed Up by the Tide of Alcohol.

Cardinal Logue, after making reference to the millions of pounds spent by Ireland on intoxicants, says:

"What possibilities of happiness, comfort, improvement and progress does this vast sum open up for the people? Yet it is wasted, not in promoting the well being, but in completing the misery, of our people. Were this sum or even a fraction of it yearly spent on education, on developing the resources of the country, on improving the health of the people, on establishing local industries, it would make Ireland bloom like a garden."

"It would create comfortable homes for a teeming, happy and contented population, thus contributing more than any other remedy suggested to stop the drain of the blood which is draining away the very lifeblood of our country."

"But what is this sum, vast as it appears, what are the possibilities of material prosperity which it suggests, compared with the eternal destiny of one soul redeemed by the blood of Christ? Yet souls are perishing in hundreds—yes, even in thousands—from drink and the fatal consequences that follow in its train."

"Truly this furnishes a subject for serious searching of hearts among us. Let us pray with the fervor of his people and at whose hands he will demand their blood."

BE SOBER OR GO TO JAIL.

A Pious Justice's Alternative to a Prison Sentence.
A certain Justice of the peace of East Poughkeepsie, N. Y., requires all persons brought before him on a charge of drunkenness to sign the following total abstinence pledge:

"I, having been convicted before me of the crime of public intoxication, in order to obtain a suspension of sentence do hereby pledge myself to abstain from intoxicating liquors for a period of one year from the date hereof, and in case I should be arrested and convicted of intoxication within that period I will submit myself to be sent to prison for the full term of the law."

It is stated that this unique method has greatly reduced drunkenness in the town.

A Veteran Lawyer's Verdict.
One of the oldest lawyers in the state of Pennsylvania, Mr. M. E. Sayers, lately sent this pointed reply to a distiller's circular: "Your letter at hand recommending your good old whisky. I have known the good old copper distilled whisky to send seven sons and three grandsons of the distiller to drunkards' graves. If I wanted to direct a man straight to hell I would advise him to engage in the manufacture or sale of whisky. I have seen sixty-nine years of whisky and have seen no good, but evil continually, from whisky."

It Has Made Milwaukee Famous.
The report of the superintendent of the Milwaukee Beer House, recently is used, contains the following strong statements: "Beer houses and cheap saloons are responsible for more than two-thirds of Milwaukee county's paupers. These places not only make dependent poor, but keep them so when they have become accustomed to patronize them."

Brighter Outlook in Germany.
The consumption of alcohol in the form of drinks increased but slightly in Germany in the decade from 1892 to 1902.

Chicken Cholera.
It is claimed that equal parts of red pepper, alum, rosin and sulphur will cure chicken cholera. Feed a tablespoonful of this mixture to three pints of scalded meal every day.

EGG BOUND HENS.

Permitting Chickens to Run Together May Be the Cause.

Sometimes we have had trouble from hens becoming what is called "egg bound." This is caused by excess of fat, constipation or an unusually large size of the eggs. Mr. Valentine in Tribune Farmer gives the following treatment for this trouble, which is by no means rare. He says:

"In simpler cases the injection of a little olive oil, with gentle rubbing in a downward direction, may be all that is needed for the expulsion of the egg. In more stubborn cases it is recommended to hold the posterior parts in warm water until the muscles are relaxed, following this by the treatment previously noted. In extreme cases some puncture the egg and remove it piece-meal, using emollient applications later. It is only in the case of valuable birds that so much trouble is worth while. Ordinarily, considering the liability to recurrence, the best thing to do is to use the bird for food before she gets really sick or is lost in an acute attack. Fluid extract of ergot in five drops given three times a day is recommended for the help of this tendency."

There are many manifestations of ovarian troubles or of the egg duct which seem quite freakish, doubtless because we do not understand their cause. One season when I raised Leghorns exclusively about one out of five of all the pullets that laid early in the fall was egg bound, and most of them died. All the young ran together until six months old, and to this I attribute the trouble. It has never appeared since after this fashion, although it might be expected, since the Browns lay a very large egg for their size and the pullets fatten very easily, but the eggs are uniform, seldom an abnormal size."

No Profit in Scrubs.

Inferior or scrub stock of any kind is a disgrace and not profitable to keep. Good blood is the foundation of success, says O. P. Greey in Commercial Poultry. In nothing does good blood show so strongly as in poultry. Breeding birds strictly to the standard is the only way to have prize winners in the showroom, but that does not always prove that they are best for practical purposes. Sometimes poultry is bred too close, and each generation becomes a little more delicate in health and less productive in eggs and meat. The first and most important thing is to have

POULTRY RAISING.

Meritorious Paragraphs For the Prospective Beginner.

If contemplating the poultry business think twice before you leap, and then make only an experimental leap. Get on the bottom round of the ladder, so to speak, and climb up. You will then be able to keep your feet on the top round when you get there, otherwise you may not—the chances are you will not—says I. B. Gardner in Commercial Poultry.

The field of poultry culture offers excellent opportunities for those who are made of the right stuff.

Poultry intelligence is handled is a source of profit; otherwise a source of loss and disappointment.

The successful poultryman must be a thinker as well as a worker.

The poultryman who will succeed must meet failure and disappointment with an unflinching determination to win.

The work of the poultryman is not hard, but he must keep constantly at it. There is always something to do.

Fifth and common make poor companions, but poultry does better without either.

Careful breeding has made some strains of some breeds or varieties better than others; but, taking all things into consideration, there is not such a great difference in breeds.

The best brood for you is the breed you like best of those best suited to your locality and market conditions.

Prize winners are not produced from haphazard matings nor 250 egg hens from "shift for themselves" fowls.

The best matings of the best birds produce their culls; hence it is a waste of time to breed from a poor foundation.

Success in the poultry business is not in making no mistakes, for the best of us make mistakes, but in not making the same mistakes over and over again.

Filling the water fountains, grit and sand boxes, yet not feed them. They do not add to poultry profits. It's doing the things when needed that counts.

Take lessons from the older and more experienced poultrymen. They know some things you have yet to learn.

But don't be afraid to do some experimenting on your own account.

The young poultryman should not be discouraged by temporary failure and disappointment. He should take courage in that those enjoying success were one time where he is today.

The lessons we seem to pay for the dearest are, after all, many times the most profitable lessons.

How to Raise Turkeys.

Secure a box about fourteen inches square and about eight inches deep. Put some dry dirt in this box first with a little sliver of lime mixed in it, then some soft straw. Place not over ten to eleven eggs in the one so prepared nest. After they have been set upon eighteen to twenty days dampen them with a little warm water. In four or five days rest it.

When the turkeys have hatched do not be in a hurry to get them out of the nest. On a warm day twelve hours is soon enough, and upon a cold day twenty-four hours is better. When you take them out place them in a dry, warm, clean coop and feed on hard-boiled milk to drink. Feed regularly three times a day for the first two or three days, then feed five times a day regularly.

At first little turks need to be kept quiet and warm and do not need much food. After they are about five days old feed light bread crumbs and feed four times a day, but at night give a little egg. Give all the milk they will consume if you can afford it. When about three weeks old let them out for two hours in the heat of the day, but do not let them get wet or cold. After they are six weeks of age they will give no more trouble than a strong, healthy chicken.—A. V. Meersch in Western Poultry Journal.

Great Britain's Whisky Consumption.
Whisky is consumed in Great Britain at the rate of 7,000,000 gallons a year. Twenty years ago only 30 per cent was distilled from maize, molasses, etc., and 70 per cent from barley malt, whereas now the proportion is reversed.
