BALLSTON.

Among the earliest settlers along the northern border of this county was Isaac Ball, of Ballston, who made a home where the town of Ballston now stands. There he and his good wife raised a large family and he became a prominent citizen, serving two terms as county commissioner. Ten years ago he was laid to rest in the family burying ground and now she sleeps beside him and their eight deceased children. Among other persons who repose in that cemetery we may mention W. C. LaFollette, who died in 1887 and Wm. Comery, who departed this life in 1896. A grandson, George Ball, lived at the old homestead for years but has moved to McMinnville and C. H. Brooks, who married a granddaughter, Bernice Bowman, now lives there. And as Davidson and wife came in 1846 and for many years were Mr. Ball's nearest neighbors. They too, had a large family. Uncle Andrew and Aunt Rachel are resting in the old Pleasant Hill cemetery but their children and grandchildren are still among us. Mrs. John McCulloch has a nice new home just in front of the old homestead where she was raised. Uncle Jack Delashmutt was an early day settler on the neighboring place where her sister, Mrs. John Campbell, now lives. Hathaway Yocom was another early day settler and his children are still around. The old store in which Geo. Fairgrieve sold goods 15 to 20 years ago still stands but is vacant. In passing there we thought of his dog that always went to the train for mail thrown off by the conductor. Ballston has witnessed many changes in the mercantile business. The present storekeeper is Peter Cook, who went there from Rickreall and also keeps the post office. F. W. Royal has charge of the depot and Wm. Fudge is the blacksmith. Miss Edith Witzel has charge of the public school. Miss Nina Alderman being her assistant. Mrs. Thomas Woodley keeps boarders and feeds transient people. Her son, Avery Atkins, is a soldier in the Philippines and her father, N. Conner, gave the ground for Pleasant Hill church and cemetery. Her mother was a daughter of Grandfather Buell, of Mill Creek. In the immediate vicinity of Ballston are about 275 acres of hops most of them being in a body between the town and the Yamhill river. There are now eight hop dryers and three or four more will soon be needed. The hop acreage around Ballston is about as follows: N. F. Gregg 20 acres, D. C. Saling, 30,

Henry Clamfield, 40, Amos Koub 16, George Clark 32, R. C. Craven 20, Wm. Yocom 16, George Ball 32, Cliff Ball 50, Sam Ball 50, Tillery & Clark 35. The tile and brick kiln formerly operated by George Shew and John Jones, of Dallas, is not in operation. At the south edge of town V. B. Sears has an attractive new home and big barn. A majority of the inhabitants are at work in the hop yards or on neighboring farms. Among the pioneers we met were Jas. Newbill and Felt Sears. The warehouse owned by R. C. Craven, of Dallas, has room enough to store a large amount of grain and other things. The Woodmen lodge has a large membership and church and Sunday school services are well attended. Kenneth Campbell and family having moved to the old H. M. Waller place south of Monmouth, his farm is being run by his son-in-law, R. M. Caldwell, who is erecting a large, new barn. Not far away south are the well cared for farms of C. D. Nairn. Henry Byerly and Felix Comery. John McCulloch who was so prominent a farmer at Sheridan Junction, died last December and W. S. Koon's lives in the new house, the old one being vacant and the family at Ballston. Just yonder to the north is the big famous Broadmead farm now owned by the Ladds. (Portland). Fine stock was formerly a prominent feature of the place but now it is mostly devoted to general farming.
