Wool Sells Well. At the wool growers meeting here last Saturday the pool was sold to H. L. Fenton for 25 cents, it being the highest price obtained in over twenty years. Perhaps twice within that time it has reached 25 cents but has generally been several cents lower. It is thought that the whole clip will be sheared, sold and shipped several weeks earlier than has been the custom. As the grade of our sheep and the quality of the wool has been improved and nearly all sheep have fared well during the winter there is apt to be more and better wool than in the past. The present experience will give decided encouragement and impulse to the sheep industry.
