Spending some hours there with our eyes and ears open, we gleaned a variety of facts and impressions. Nearly all the business houses had the appearance of being reasonably prosperous and most of the homes gave evidence of good care and refined inmates, but the occupants of some houses should either clean up their surroundings and make their places of abode look better, or move out into the backwoods where their lazy habits and sloven ways would not be so offensive to others. There is an impression abroad that the town is below par morally and we were watching and inquiring for evidences of it. We learned that the bawdy house whose proprietress paid \$100 fine at circuit court is still in existence but that its degraded and polluting inmates keep in the back ground. We learned that in spite of the fines at grand jury time for gambling it is still being done though more secretly and we learned that some of the saloons still have their back doors open on Sunday though several times fined for it. We saw some human beings whose countenances, dress and other things proved them to be very low in the scale of humanity and decorum. Those are the dark and unpraiseworthy sides of the picture and their number is small compared to the whole population. Strange to say some men whose families are among the best in the place are in sympathy with such characters probably because they think it pays. But a great majority of the Independence people are as good as the best in the state. They are well educated and refined in both feelings and manners. PIONEERS REUNION.

Last Saturday the weather was fine and there was a far bigger gathering here than anybody expected. They came in all kinds of conveyances and from everywhere. Marshal L. N. Bellen got the procession in line, headed by the Buena Vista band and by 11 o'clock the city park was crowded with people. After music by the band there was a quartet by Misses Gates, Roy, Morrison and McDevitt and then Judge Hewitt, of Albany, gave one of the most pleasing addresses our pioneers had listened to in years. Somehow he managed to get closer to their hearts than public speakers usually do. His father, Henry Hewitt, came to this country in 1843 and for many years lived near Wheatland at the northern edge of this county. After the speaking the contents of many bountiful baskets were spread in the cool, beautiful grove and the pioneers and their friends had a delicious and delightful time generally. At the afternoon business meeting J. H. Hawley was reelected president of the association with Dr. Embree as vice president and J. D. Smith secretary and treasurer. A committee consisting of T. J. Hayter, J. Williams and F. M. Collins awarded a rocking chair to Mrs. Judith Shelton as the oldest pioneer present and another to Dr. Embree as the oldest settler. She has lived here for sixty years. When C. D. Embree came in 1844 the only settlers around were the three Applegate brothers and John East at Salt Creek and the Shaws at Eola. There was not another white settler between them and the California line. Those people are all dead and Dr. Embree is the oldest child of C. D. Embree, who lived just this side of Rickreall. Now all hands repaired to the college campus to witness the athletic sports. A Dallas baseball team easily defeated one composed of Polk and Rickreall players. The 100 yard dash was won by young Porterfield, of Buena Vista, and George Morton, of Dallas, was the 50 yard race. The three legged race premium was carried away by Shaw Bros., of Polk. The successful ones in the three pillow fights were Mr. Shaw, George Morton and Laird Woods while Tom Rowell came out ahead in the fat man's race. After supper the horse race was won by company No. 1. An exciting barrel race was won by Clarence Gray and someone else came out ahead in the wheelbarrow race. In the relay race Burch, Porterfield and Southwick were among the winners. So much interest was kept that many country people did not go home until long after dark.
