Development League.

The attendance of the Development League convention at Independence Monday and Tuesday was fair though less than expected. The bankers association met first with Ira Powell, of Monmouth, as chairman and R. E. Williams, of Dallas, as secretary. A committee of seven was appointed to arrange for a permanent organization to be effected in Portland next month. President Hofer called the league meeting to order and B. F. Jones spoke of the importance of opening Yaquina bay, and was followed by L. M. Gilbert and Mr. Birmingham. The clambake at the park in the evening was immense. Thirty bushels of clams, a big beef, many chickens and a short ton of other things were devoured by the 1000 people present. Later on there were several speeches at the opera house the climax being capped by Homer Davenport, the famous cartoonist, who spoke in a humorous way of his boyhood days around Silverton. Tuesday forenoon there were several addresses on different subjects and at noon the meeting came to a close. Judge Coad, the writer and several others from Dallas went over on the 1 o'clock motor, expecting an afternoon session. Others around the country met a like disappointment. We spent the afternoon interviewing the citizens generally, the consensus being that the convention was not a bowling success. Several expected speakers, including Governor Cham-

berlain, were absent and somehow there was an impression that others had political axes to grind. Many of the things were excellent and well worth hearing but a general air of disappointment prevailed. The published program was not followed and many who went at appointed times to hear certain things found things mixed up. The people of the town are by no means to blame for any shortcoming for they did all they could to add to the success of the meeting.
