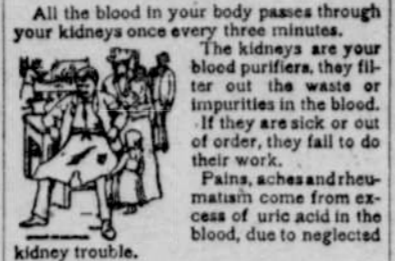
LIBERTY AND BEYOND.

John Harris and family have been visiting Bellevue friends. Sundays rain was good for gardens but bad for unshocked hay.

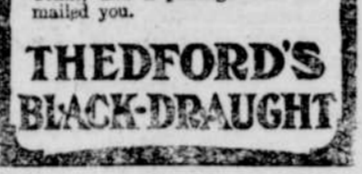
Orval Price, Norman Daniels and Norman Koub have been fishing. R. L. Sears was here Sunday from Hillsboro where he is repairing bicycles.
