Our Water Works.
Owing to a difference of opinion in the Corvallis Council regarding the advisability of taking the water for their

new system from either the river or the mountains back of town much has lately been said by the papers there regarding Dallas water. One of their council men went so far as to come to Dallas and have a long statement drawn up of the facts here. It contained a number of mis-statements which were in the same paper refuted by affidavits from some of our most prominent citizens. This brings up a question however, that will be settled at a future meeting of our council. Many of our citizens are of the opinion, that the present system is charging higher rates than is necessary for a good paying business and an effort will be made by them to have the city council make new ones more in accord with what our residents are willing to pay. No objection has so far been offered by anyone to the water. It is good and pure but the charge for irrigation purposes is unquestionably higher than there is any need of and the hours allotted insufficient for those with only small lawns to keep them in the shape desired. It is probable that a petition to that effect will be presented at the next meeting of the council.
