Wool Growers Meeting. They met in Browns hall last Saturday afternoon. G. W. McBea presiding. The object of the meeting was stated and Secretary Fenton made a complete report regarding the wool pool. He said he was ready to comply with his agreement to pay the growers an extra cent per pound, but as they had agreed to pay him 1/2 cent per pound for his services they refused to accept more than 1/2 cents extra from him. When it came to electing a secretary to take charge of next seasons clip of wool and mohair, Mr. Fenton insisted on a new man being chosen, but the growers considered

him as the best man for the place and he was reelected without a dissenting voice. The time set for entering the mohair pool was fixed as February 1, 1906, and April 15, 1906, was voted as time of entering sheep wool pool. As there has been some friction in the past over failure to sign contracts and difference of opinion as to the moral obligation to stick to verbal agreements the rule will hereafter be more strictly observed and no person will be considered to have entered either pool unless he signs a contract before above mentioned date. Among the prominent sheep men present were J. D. Kelly, J. H. Hawley, T. W. Brunk, Joe Craven, C. N. McArthur, J. B. Smith, E. C. McTimmonds, R. M. Fowle, J. B. Nesmith, W. M. Jones and H. W. Dickinson.
